A French student, aged 15, had his mobile phone stolen in the city.

A third incident took place at Denmark Street at 1.30am on Saturday, July 9. In this case a 23 year old male stole money from a woman who was walking on the street. Fortunately, he was identified by Gardal from Henry Street with the aid of CCTV, and has been arrested and charged with the theft.

House break-ins at Annacotty and Rhebogue

A householder at Elm Road in Riverbank, Annacotty, awoke when he heard the front door of the house being forced open.

The thieves ransacked the living room and stole a black 42" LG flat screen television. Having been disturbed by the householder, the intruders made their escape in a silver Audi A4. It is believed that there were four males involved.

In Rhebogue, a home owner was awoken in the early hours of the morning by the sound of intruders downstairs.

The person awoke on hearing noise downstairs. He went to check and discovered that a black Nikon Coolpix P100 camera Serial No. 40331375, a Sony Experia mobile phone Serial No. CB5A1FFMCU and a black Nokia Express Music mobile phone Serial No. 002D8NO, as well as house keys, were stolen.

Pathway cyclists pose danger to pedestrians


THERE is now a growing need to regulate cyclists in Limerick and to apply some basic safety precautions to their activities to ensure that pedestrians are protected, according to a spokesman for Republican Sinn Fein.

Sean O'Neill from Quinn's Cottages in Prospect, said that cyclists are now using public pathways in addition to cycle lanes and pose a danger to the public. "Many cyclists are listening to radio or tape devices while they cycle and this impairs their ability to be fully aware of their surroundings.

"In addition many bikes are not fitted with bells and pedestrians have no way of knowing that cyclists are behind them.

"While the move to cycle transport is being encouraged by the local authority there are no basic safety rules that are applied. The provision of cycle lanes is welcome but pedestrians must also be protected".

He concluded: "If it is against the law for a motorist to use a mobile phone while driving surely there is an equal danger posed by a cyclist who is listening to a tape device while cycling".


"It was a marvellous experience working with such talented people. The positive aspect is that the scenes in which I appear are integral to the narrative in Chris' story".

Retailers put on alert to payment card scam

GARDAI are warning retailers about scams involving so called 'test' transactions purported to be carried out on behalf of payment card service providers.

This scam involves a phone call being made to a retailer from a person who claims to be a manager from the payment card service provider.

The caller instructs the retailer to put through a 'test' transaction on their card terminal. This transaction actually debits large amounts of money from the retailer's account and credits it to a debit or credit card.

The caller then instructs the retailer that the system is working fine and instructs him or her to throw away or destroy the transaction slip.

An attempt to carry out this type of scam took place at a Limerick city based electrical retailer's premises.

A shop assistant received a call from a man who claimed to be a credit card terminal engineer, who successfully persuaded the assistant to put through a number of so called 'test' transactions totalling over £12,000 in value. Fortunately, the credit card company became suspicious of the transactions and did not process them, but instead, contacted the retailer.

Retailers should be aware that card payment providers do not test systems in this way and they also need to advise all staff members not to carry out these transactions.

In any case of doubt, the payment card services provider should be contacted on a listed number and staff should not use a contact number provided to them over the phone by an unknown person.
