

## THE LIMERICK PIPER



A painting by Joseph Haverty (1794-1864), of Galway, of Padraig O'Briain, entitled "The Limerick Piper." O'Briain, born at Leaba Sioda, in County Clare, about 1773, was a classical scholar, but he became totally blind at twenty-six, and settled in Limerick City as a player of the Union pipes. Harverty saw him at The Crescent, near Hartstonge Street, and painted him with his daughter by his side. A bad fall on the ice in 1855 left the piper helpless, and he died in poverty in Nicholas Street on December 1, 1856. He was burled in Kilquane Cemetery, Haverty's painting was bought by Sir Robert Gore-Booth, and is presumably still preserved at Lissadell, County Sligo. A small repetition of the picture was made by Harverty and is now in the National Gallery. Lithograph copies, are still treasured in many Irish homes.
