**NO EXCUSE**

**Bryan Gryeene**, publican, 63 William Street, Limerick, was at Limerick District Court yesterday fined £5 for a breach of the licensing laws at 12.20 a.m. on January 29. The offence was admitted.

Inspector Patrick Spillane, prosecuting, told the Court that two Gardai saw four men in the bar portion of the premises.

The owner was not on the premises that night, and when questioned, the barman, P. McMahon, said: "I have no excuse" One of the men said "we were having a talk."

Mr. M. Tynan, defending, said that the premises were extremely well conducted and this was Mr. Greene's first conviction.

The men found on the premises were fined £1 each.

**Row over paintings of nudes**

Five nudes painted in the abstract style, which are hanging in the Irish winter artists' exhibition in the Limerick City Art Gallery, have caused a controversy among committee members.

All the paintings are by Limerick artists and the decision to exhibit them came after two controversial meetings. At the first of these, the selection committee failed to agree and referred the matter to the 15 member advisory committee for a decision.

Again the discussion resulted in deadlock and it was left to the casting vote of the chairman, Councillor Frank Glasgow, to make a decision.

**AESTHETIC**

Councillor Glasgow voted in favour of hanging the pictures. "I did so because objections to the pictures were not made on aesthetic grounds," he told me.

He added: "I do not believe that an artist should be confined in expressing himself."

It is understood that objections arose because of the proximity of the art gallery to the children's library.

**LIMERICK District Court** was told three local men went for a "joy in a car stolen from a garage and we by Military Police at the Curragh Kildare.

Before the Court were Ignatius Garvey and Gerard Cleary, both of 60, Clarina Avenue, Ballinacurra Weston, and a 16 year-old youth.

Garvey was charged with unlawfully taking possession of the car and driving it without insurance. The youth appeared on a charge of unlawfully taking possession. Cleary was charged with unlawfully taking possession of the car, breaking and entering and a larceny.

Justice de Burca sentenced Cleary to six months imprisonment on the larceny charge with the breaking and entering taken into account. The unlawful possession charge, in Cleary's case, was dismissed.

He adjourned the case against Garvey for three months, to see how he would behave in the meanwhile, and imposed two suspensory sentences of six months imprisonment. The case against the 16-years-old youth was dismissed.

**MADE SOME TEA**

In the larceny case against Cleary, Det. Sergt. G. O'Sullivan said in evidence that he interviewed the defendant at William Street Station on Monday last and took a statement.

In the alleged statement, which was read to the Court, Cleary said that he had been walking around the city at about 11 o'clock on January 23 last and decided to enter the premises of G. & J. F. Bourke in Henry Street.

He entered the premises by a skylight and stole an air pistol, cigarettes and blades to the value of £44-10-4. Before leaving the premises he made himself some tea.

The Justice was then told that Cleary, who was single and unemployed, had six previous convictions—most of them for larceny.

Added Inspector Patrick Spillane, who prosecuted: "When Sergt. O'Sullivan was investigating this case the defendant was most co-operative."

Justice de Burca—I am going to give him credit for that. I was thinking of giving him 12 months, but in view of what the Inspector has told me I will reduce it to six.

He said to the defendant "Since you don't seem to have any intention of reforming, I am not so sure that I shouldn't send you forward to the Circuit Court, where you could be sent to penal servitude."

Sergt. M. Brown, who investigated the taking of the car, was the principal State witness against Ignatius Garvey, who pleaded guilty to both charges.

**NO SUCH PERSON**

The Sergeant told the Court that when he interviewed the three defendants in Newbridge Garda Station, two of them gave false names. They also told him that they got the car from Garvey's brother-in-law whose name, they said, was Ryan. It was found, on investigation, that there was no such person.

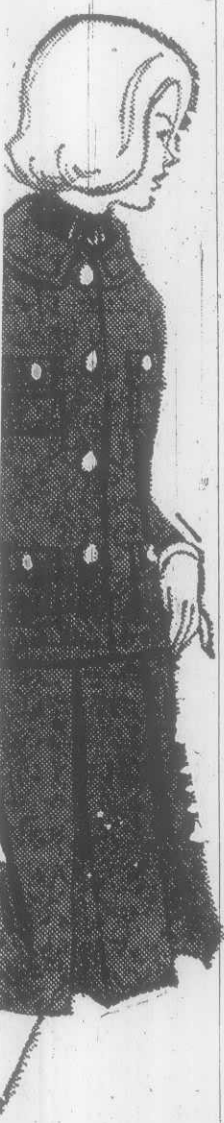
