Gallery picketed as EVA art row flares up again

AN UNREPENTANT Mr.
Richard Coughlan — the
city cafe owner who attempt-
ed to deface an award-
winning graphic print,
which he labelled "pornog-
raphic" in the EVA Exhibi-
tion — this Wednesday, led
a picket outside the Muni-
cipal Art Gallery, where the
display is being staged.

Men and women carried
protest placards.

On Thursday last Mr.
Coughlan, owner of the
Treaty Cafe in Nicholas
Street, tried to spray paint
on a print by Limerick artist
Richard Lilburn which won
the £500 graphic prize in the
exhibition.

chairman, prevented Mr.
Coughlan from spraying the
picture with paint and strug-
gled with him. Mr. Cough-
lan did succeed in breaking
the glass covering the print
and causing damage to the
work.

Statement

No Garda action has been
taken as a result of the
incident to date, but Mr.
Murray told the *Limerick
Leader* that they would be
furnishing the Gardai with a
statement outlining the in-
cident. Detectives at Edward
Street are investigating the
matter.

This Wednesday, Mr.
Coughlan and a number of
others picketed the gallery.
One of the pickets carried a
number of exhibition cata-
logues.

He explained that they
were showing the reproduc-
tion of the "offending pic-
ture" to "people over 18"
who requested to see it.

The pickets were also
protesting against the trans-
fer of the city library to the
Granary.

Meanwhile, in a state-
ment issued on behalf of the
EVA committee, Mr. Mur-
ray said:

"The committee of EVA
deplore the recent incident
in which one of the works in
the EVA '84 exhibition was

Goal total up by £28,000 in a single week

THE PEOPLE OF LIMERICK continue to respond magnificently to
the Ethiopian Famine Fund and at mid-day this Thursday a reported
£120,000 had been collected by the various agencies — with the Goal
organisation fund alone topping £63,000, an increase of £28,000 in the
past week.

Old age pensioners, the
less well off sections of the
community, factory work-
ers, school children and
voluntary bodies have ral-
lied to the cause of the
starving millions in strife-
torn Ethiopia.

The largest individual che-
que received to date was for
£7,000 from Analog Devices
at Raheen, half of which was
contributed by the company.

And at a Zonta collection
point at Dunnes Stores in
Caherdavin at the weekend,
an eight year-old boy handed
in his piggy bank, with a
collection of coins.

Kilkishen Wren Boys, the
Motley Crew Entertainers
from the Granary Tavern and
the McCormack Singers, and

again a substantial sum was
raised.

Collections

Coffee mornings organised
by people in their own homes
continue to be a splendid
source of funds. Office and
factory staff collections con-
tinue and have made a very
significant contribution to the
fund.

It is believed that several
office parties planned for
Christmas have been cancel-
led, the money instead being
given over for the Ethiopian
Fund.

On Monday night next a
disco will be held in Poldarks,
Two Mile Inn, the entire
proceeds of which will be
donated to Goal.

Mayor Frank Prendergast's
Ethiopian fund has now top-
ped £12,000.

"I don't believe any nation
in the history of the world has
responded as well as the Irish

Priorities

Miss Breda McAuliffe of
the Limerick Goal Fund, said
that the sad plight of the
Ethiopians had made people
more aware of their priorities
in life.

She paid tribute to the
workers of Analog for their
magnificent contribution —
"but at the same time the coins
from the young lad at Caher-
davin were equally impor-
tant."

This Thursday, the Goal
cargo aircraft leaves Dublin
laden with essential medical
supplies, food and two Land
Rovers, which are vital to the
distribution network.

The value of the cargo on
board is approximately
£250,000, a very significant
part of which was paid for by
the Limerick Goal fund.

In addition, two Goal
nurses will leave this week to
join their colleagues in
Ethiopia.

During the past two weeks
Mrs. Racl and Mrs. Burke of
St. Munchin's parish have
organised a collection for
famine relief which realised
the splendid sum of over
£3,000 and they handed their
cheque to Goal on Tuesday
night.

The gardai in Mary St.
Station also donated the pro-
ceeds of their collection to
Goal at the weekend.

The opening of the new
Parkway Shopping Centre
brought thousands of people
who were entertained by the

vandalised on the pretext of making a protest against so-called pornography. We accept that people are entitled to their opinion on art, but cannot accept that such opinions, however deeply felt, are a licence to destroy property."

He said that no objections were made prior to the act of "publicity-seeking vandalism".

Integrity

Mr. Murray added: "We must also defend the integrity of the artist whose work was damaged. He is an artist of serious intent, who expresses himself in his work without intention to offend and has been personally hurt by this incident, apart from the fact that the work is an original and is irreplaceable."

"The violent intolerance implicit in this incident has far deeper implications for our society than the alleged offence on which the artist is accused."

"The committee also regret the role of the *Limerick Leader* in the incident as follows:

"Before the incident, a reporter informed the chairman of EVA that he had information that the work was going to be defaced in the following half-hour, but that he could not reveal any further information."

"The chairman went to the gallery, to find the reporter and a colleague present, but the reporter would not identify the would-be perpetrator, who was known to be present."

"Shortly afterwards the work was attacked and the chairman, attempting to restrain the attacker, fell to the floor, which was strewn with broken glass, and a struggle ensued. It is fortunate that no serious injury occurred. During the incident the reporter took notes and, it subsequently transpired, his colleague took photographs."

Full facts

"The committee feel that the incident could have been avoided altogether if the *Leader* had divulged the full facts in its possession about the intention of a person to commit a crime. It seemed to be more concerned with sensationalising a news item rather than public safety, at the expense of the artist (whose work is irreplaceable), EVA, the City Gallery and the perpetrator."

"The committee wonders is art fair game for this kind of treatment and if information on a different type of crime came to *Leader's* notice would the same strategy of set-up, watch and photograph, be employed."

"It would be remiss of us not to note that the incident has generated much publicity for EVA. An ill wind, etc. However, we would be much happier if the interest in EVA was based on the more sure footing of a sincere interest in the role of art and the artist in society and that the work and sensibilities of an artist would not need to be sensationalised in this violent and exploitative way."

The *Limerick Leader* said in a statement this week that Mr. Murray's account of the newspaper's role in the EVA affair was distorted.

The statement added: "Mr. Coughlan informed a *Limerick Leader* reporter of his intention to deface the drawing."

"This placed the newspaper in a dilemma. Prior disclosure of Mr. Coughlan's identity would have been a breach of confidentiality. Yet the *Limerick Leader's* duty to the community demanded that the newspaper warn the exhibition organisers."

"The editor resolved the dilemma by instructing the reporter to inform Mr. Murray that the attack was imminent, but not to volunteer the name of the informant."
