Artist Angela is a Limerick leader

ANGELA WOULFE has become the first Limerick artist to open her own studio and exhibition centre in the city.

"She has shown great courage and deserves the support of the people of Limerick", said Ms. Brid Dukes of the Arts Council when officially opening the new facilities.

The premises is right across the road from the City Art Gallery at Pery Square.

Angela's new works shown at the opening created a big impression. "She is able to create an atmosphere that everyone else sees, and I hope everyone will appreciate what she has done for art in Limerick", said Ms. Dukes.

The 33 works on display range in price from £150 to £1,000 and already they are being snapped up by connoisseurs.

Angela, married and living in Caherdavin, has captured scenes known so well to the people of Limerick, with Corbally and Castleconnell particularly prominent.
