requested to provide the
capital and revenue funding
and additional staffing to

meet the immediate need
and that the Department be
requested to finance the
introduction of CAPD ini-
tially on a pilot basis for a
small number of patients
deemed suitable by the
medical consultant.

Limerick leads in collections

LIMERICK is grow-
ing in stature as the
country's major centre
of art outside of
Dublin; now a series
of six weekly lectures
by notables in the field
of art are to be held at
the City Gallery.

They will be put on
each Wednesday, start-
ing on October 13, and
will concentrate on the
history of art.

Although a formal
announcement has yet to be
made, the first lecture will
concentrate on "Images of
the Artist—the self-portrait
of the 19th century".

The second week will
feature a lecture on George
Stubbs, the noted artist who
specialised in painting race-
horses. The lecture will be
entitled, "The Artist and his
Ambition".

Both will be delivered by
representatives of the
Limerick College of Art
and Design.

Details of the other four
will be announced later.

Meanwhile, it is revealed
that the permanent collec-
tion at the Limerick City
Gallery of Art in Pery
Square reaches to well over
one hundred paintings.

Some are on permanent
exhibit, the others rotate.

One of the most famous
paintings is the giant canvas
of Arthur's Quay, and
another of the City Hall and
Patrick Street both well
over a century old.

The gallery has works by
William Orpen, Jack B.
Yeats ("The chairoplanes"),
Sean Keating RHA. (a past
president of the Royal
Academy), and Paul and
Grace Henry (the Henry
paintings of the Connemara
landscapes are famous).

One of the most notable
artists in Limerick, at the

present time, is Walter
Verling, whose works are
much in demand and sell in
the capital city.

Limerick is now the cen-
tre for the national self-por-
trait collection, which hangs
at the University: over 190
are on display. The collec-
tion had a modest beginning
in 1977, when 15 portraits
were bought.

In addition to the existing
"Art of the State" collection
at present on display at the
City Hall, there are a num-
ber of other collections
being built up within the
public service.

The patronage of the arts
by the Office of Public
Works includes many dif-
ferent forms of art works.

Their policy in relation to
the commissioning of art-
works is that pieces are
almost all by Irish or Irish-
based emerging artists.

The Government decen-
tralisation programme,
involving the relocation of
some 550 staff to Sarsfield
House in Limerick, is
aimed at making a major
economic contribution to
the city and at correcting
regional imbalances.

But it also has the effect
of generating funding for
artworks purchased to deco-
rate the new decentralised
offices.

Numerous new works by
Irish artists have also been
purchased recently to deco-
rate the new Revenue
Enquiry Office in Charlotte
Quay.

For the new Government
offices in Ennis, though 25
miles from Limerick, the
Office of Public Works has
commissioned a limestone
sculpture representing three
figures set-dancing.
