Jack Donovan, a former Head of Limerick School of Art and Design, unveiled his new exhibition of work at Limerick Printmakers gallery at the weekend.

The artist said the Limerick exhibition marked the first time that a complete new collection of his work had been purchased in its entirety.

"To be honest, if I had sold eight or 10 paintings I would have been more than happy. I think most artists would be happy if they sold half of their work at an exhibition," said Mr Donovan.

Jack Donovan's substantial body of work built up over the past four decades was displayed in a major retrospective in the Limerick City Gallery of Art in 2004.
