INQUEST IN KITCHEN

In the neat kitchen of the Heffernan family, where the deceased had lived, an inquest was held by Dr. J. Cleary, Coroner for East Limerick, sitting with a jury. The proceedings were conducted by Supt. Eamon O'Riordan, Pallas.

John Joseph Heffernan, nephew of the deceased, residing in a County Council cottage at Eyon with his parents, gave evidence that his uncle, John Lynch, was 36 years of age and worked with witness's uncle, Thomas Lynch, as a labourer. "I have seen the dead body," said witness, "and I identify it as that of my uncle, John Lynch."

Dr. Garrett Scanlan, Cappamore, said he was called to the dwelling-house of John Heffernan at Eyon at about 4.30 p.m. on Sunday last. In the bedroom of the house he saw the deceased, John Lynch, lying on his back. "On examining him I found signs of life," went on witness. "His breathing was feeble and he was pulseless. On looking at the abdomen I saw the abdomen viscera protruding through the centre of the abdominal wall. There was an open wound down the centre of the abdomen and blood around the skin and where he was lying. He was sinking rapidly and died in about ten minutes."

FOUND GUNSHOT WOUND

Dr. Maurice Hickey, State Pathologist, Dublin, said that on Monday, August 15th he performed a post mortem examination on the body of John Lynch at Eyon, Cappamore. "I found a gunshot wound in the front of the abdomen. Apart from this wound the body was that of a healthy man. Death was due to shock and haemorrhage as a result of a gunshot wound," he concluded.

Dr. Mary Frances O'Neill, M.O.H., Cappamore, said that on Sunday last she was called to the house of John Heffernan at Eyon and saw the body of the deceased in the bedroom. "On August 15th," she went on, "I assisted the State Pathologist, Dr. Maurice Hickey, in performing a post mortem on the deceased. I have heard his evidence and agree with him as to the cause of death," she said.
