BIG RED CROSS MEETING FOR LIMERICK

What is expected to be the biggest and most representative meeting ever arranged for Limerick in support of the Red Cross Society will be held in Cruise's Hotel and Thursday week next (January 18th), at 8 p.m. The aim of the meeting will be to get the city and county reorganised on a full war-time basis.

A Limerick Red Cross official to-day told the "Limerick Leader" that the meeting will be one of many held throughout the country that night. The Mayor (Mr. Kevin Bradshaw) will preside and the attendance will include Most Rev. Dr. O'Neill, Bishop of Limerick; the Minister for Local Government, Mr. M. J. Keyes; the County and City Managers and members of the Corporation and County Council.

Supt. P. Colleran prosecuted, while Mr. L. Walsh, solr. (Messrs Bennett and Walsh), defended.

Michael Stokes gave evidence that on the 21st November he was driving his motor car up towards the Crescent. There was a passenger in his car and he said to look out. Then a lorry emerged from Roche's Street and struck witness's car a glancing blow at the Roche's Street-O'Connell Street junction. Witness's car was on the left centre of the road at the time. The driver (defendant) of the lorry said after the accident that he thought witness's car was going to stop.

Cross-examined, witness said he was driving up from the William Street side and the sun was shining at the time, which was a disadvantage. The defendant's lorry was upon him before he noticed it. He would not agree that the defendant was driving slowly before the accident.

Owing to the absence of an essential witness, the Justice found that notice of service to prosecute was not proved in the case of dangerous driving and he would dismiss it without prejudice.

BRAKING SYSTEM DEFECTIVE

Guard McKenna gave evidence that he examined the lorry at the corner of Cecil Street, where it was pulled up. The braking system was defective for seven days previously. The hand brake was totally defective.

Cross-examined, witness said that the accident had no bearing on the braking system.

The defendant gave evidence that when he put on the brake the master cylinder did not work as the washer was gone.

To the Justice, witness said that he drove in from Hospital that morning, but he did not know that the brake was bad until the accident occurred.

Cross-examined by the Superintendent, witness said he drove on for 30 yards after the accident in order to get out of the line of traffic.

The Justice remarked that the lorry in the condition as stated would be liable to kill a number of people.

Mr. Walsh said that the defendant had no other means of livelihood except the use of his motor lorry.

The Justice said that he really thought that the defendant ought to lose his driving licence for a period but he hesitated to do that. The defendant was a decent, respectable man but he had not got a sense of responsibility. He would impose
