Stroke of luck for swimmers

WHEN Helen Buckley wrote an article in the Limerick Leader on July 26, 1969 she spoke of Askeaton having a "very strong swimming club but no pool." She was quick to point out, though, that there was a very active committee trying to remedy the situation. The swim club was founded ten years earlier, in 1959. Eamon McDaid, a recent member of the Askeaton community was its treasurer. "Our plans have been sanctioned by the Department of Local Government and by the County Council. We have been collecting money in various ways over the past three years and now have £2,000. We are to get a grant of £3,000 for every £1,000 we put up. It is estimated that the pool will cost up to £15,000." The pool is not heated, she wrote but dressingrooms and showers will be built with the pool "along the green stretch by the river." Project chairperson, was Ms. Ita O'Donoghue and the secretary was Brenda Kelly. Michael Mulcaire, a native of Askeaton, but domiciled in the city was also a hard worker in bringing the project to fruition. The pool was finally opened in 1971 by Minister Bobby Molloy.

The people of Askeaton are currently building a €5m centre which will contain an indoor heated pool as well as a gymnasium never ones to let the grass grow under their feet are Askeaton people. —Sean Curtin
