Fears Expressed That Bacon Industry Will Collapse

GRAVE fears were expressed at last Saturday's
meeting of the Limerick County Committee of
Agriculture that the bacon industry would collapse if
the Minister for Agriculture did not take immediate
steps to remedy the present state of affairs.

Mr. P. Clohessy, Co.C., Vice-
Chairman, presided at last Satur-
day's meeting of the Limerick Co.
Committee of Agriculture.

MARKED "READ."

A resolution was read from the
Co. Westmeath Committee of
Agriculture calling on the Minis-
ter for Agriculture to give serious
consideration to the question of
the nationalisation of the pig and
bacon industry in the Republic
and thereby protect the producer
and consumer from the fleecing
they were undergoing at present.

Mr. Canty proposed that the
resolution be marked "read."

THREE GRADES.

The C.I.A.O. reminded the Com-
mittee that within the last month
the Minister for Agriculture,
speaking in the Dail, had announ-
ced that it was his intention to
introduce three grades of pigs
with corresponding grades of
prices to the producer.

Mr. Quish pointed out that the
price of pigs had dropped 25/-
per cwt. in two days.

SOMETHING VERY WRONG.

"There is something very, very
wrong," he remarked. "The people
will be driven out of bacon pro-
duction and I don't believe for
one moment that nationalisation
is any remedy for the position.
There is something very gravely
wrong. We have spoken so often

about this here that I dislike
speaking about it again, but I
think we should pass another re-
solution asking the Minister to
take immediate remedial steps
before the entire bacon industry
collapses."

Mr. Canty—I agree. Nationalisa-
tion is no cure for anything in
this country or any other country.

Mr. Mackey—The people will
go out of bacon production alto-
gether.

REDUCTION NOT PASSED ON TO THE PUBLIC.

Mr. Keane—I can't understand
it at all; even the reduction in
the price of pigs has not been
passed on to the public.

Mr. Quish—Actually, the last
time the price of pigs was re-
duced the following week the
price was raised to the public.
How can you reconcile these two
things at all?

Mr. Canty said that there were
two grades of bacon being sold
in the wholesale trade, but he
did not see any other grade.

Mr. Mackey seconded Mr.
Quish's resolution, which was pas-
sed unanimously.

The resolution from Westmeath
was marked "read."
