A PLAINTIFF giving evidence in a case involving a right of way, at Limerick Circuit Court, said the defendant produced a shotgun and said he would blow his head off if he replaced a gate.

The plaintiff, Timothy Cunningham, Derreen, Athea, sought an
order restraining the defendant,
Timothy Healy, Derreen, Athea,
from interfering with a gate on the
right of way, or from interfering
with the width of the right of way.
Judge Timothy Desmond said he
was satisfied that the right of way in
question was owned by the plaintiff, and therefore the gate was a
matter for him.
He said the defendant only had a
right to use the right of way to get to
his own house, and did not have
any right to interfere with the width
of the right of way.

Granted

Judge Desmond granted the necessary declarations and injunctions to the plaintiff.

The authority of the defendant to use the right of way in question was not an issue in the case.

Timothy Cunningham told the court that the right of way was granted to a brother of the defendant in 1968.

Witness said the defendant erected a gate on the right of way, which remained until the defendant removed it, in 1980.

"I then replaced the gate, to keep my catite off the road. It remained until the defendant removed it in February 1982," said witness.
"Healy built a garage at his

"Healy built a garage at his home, and he probably considered it an inconvenience to be opening and closing the gate," added

and closing the gate," added witness.

He said the defendant had a minibus for hire, and went in and out four times a day, leaving the Witness said that on one occasion the defendant produced a double-barrel shotgun and told witness that he would blow his head off if he replaced the gate. He told the court that he seeking an order to have the gate witness and he sold a 12 foot right of way, witness said he sold a 12 foot right of way, which was now widened in parts to 15 foot eight inches.
