He played in the celebrated "McNamara's Band"

THERE are few who are not familiar with the song—"My Name Is McNamara, I'm The Leader Of The Band, Although We're Small In Numbers We're The Best Band In The Land"; but how many know that the celebrated McNamara's Band got its name from four Limerick brothers? The last of this famous quartette of musicians, 81-year-old Thomas McNamara, is now concluding a holiday in his native Limerick. He is also the only surviving member of the St. Mary's Prize Band that won the All-Ireland Championship in 1895

Last Sunday, the Feast of the sumption, was a day of many memories for Thomas. It marked the Feast of St. Mary's Parish, where he was born, and the 80th birthday of St. Mary's fife and drumband, of which he is now 71 years a member. And, as the band par. led to St. Mary's Church, the only member he knew from the old days was 85 year-old "Ducker" Nash

In the old days, Thomas's brother, Patrick, was kandmaster of the prize band of 1895 that wor the championship from 26 other groups. As a musician there were few in Limerick ho could claim to be his peer and he was also well known as a composer. Patrick played throughout the

Patrick played throughout the 32 counties, at balls, pattern day celebrations, St. Patrick's Day parades, and the banner proclaiming "McNamara's Band," of which he was the leader, was a familiar and welcome sight.

When he emigrated to the United States in 1905 he carried 'th him this great musical tradition, and his orchestra there continued to be known as "McNamara's Band." Thomas had already gone to the States in 1901, and it was there that this talented combination caught the imagination of a great song writer, and the famous ballad, "McNamara's Band," was

RECORDINGS

In later years many discs were cut for Voralion Records by the McNamara trio, Thomas on the piccolo; Paddy, the violin, and Paddy's daughter, Eileen, on the piano. A number of these were cut by the Aeolean Company in 1921, and some—Irish set tunes, reel medleys, Irish waltz medleys and ancient Irish classics—are treasured family possessions in the home of Thomas's niece, Mrs. Isabel'a McCarthy, 34 Nicholas 'Street, Limerick.

Patrick, who did much to popularise Irish music in the United States, came back to Limerick with his wife and six children on a visit in 1912. The return trip was to be made on the Titanic, but, Providentially, this arrangement was altered. The Titanic sank on the voyage with a loss of some 1,600 lives.

The two other bothers — all four played together in the one row with St. Mary's Fife and Drum Band—were Michael and John. Michael who fought in the Boer War, was an instructor and Sergeant of the Munster Fusiliers. He retired with the rank of Regimental Sergeant Major, and died in Deevon three years ago. John was also attached to a regimental band, but was transferred to an ambulance Corps during World War I. He was killed in France in
