Mayor Kennedy congratulated the band on their many achievements over the past seven years and, in particular, "their elevation to Grade 2, the highest grade of pipe band in Ireland, and their invitation to represent Ireland at the Lorient Interceltique Festival in Brittany in August of 1986".

Mayor Kennedy said that the success of the band, which consisted of many ex-members of the C.B.S. Pipe Band, could be seen from the fact that they had achieved much in a very short history, including being six times Munster champions in various grades, and winning the best band trophy from overseas at the World Pipe Band Championships in Scotland in 1981, 1982 and 1983.

At present, Arthur Ellis is designing and making new dress uniforms for the band, which they will use in competition.
