ANOTHER OUTRAGE IN CLARE.—Dr. P. M. Cullinan, J.P., held a Court at Ennis Police Barrack to-day, when three brothers named Griffy were brought up charged with being suspected as connected with a gang of armed moonlighters who on Tuesday night attacked the house of James Leary, a respectable farmer residing near Corofin, demolishing the frames and glass of the windows, fired shots, and threw large stones into the dwelling, but without injuring any of the inmates. There being no incriminating evidence against the prisoners, the presiding magistrate admitted them out on bail to appear at Corofin Petty Sessions on Thursday next.

SUDDEN DEATH.—We regret to record the very sudden death of Miss Alice Barton, aged 21, sister of one of the principal assistants in the office of Mr John Roberts, Traffic Manager of the Waterford and Limerick Railway. It would appear that on Monday evening the young lady took tea at the house of a relative, and on returning home to John Square by the Roxboro Road became suddenly ill. She was taken to the house of a friend, where every possible attention was paid her, but in a short time death ensued from hemorrhage of the lungs. Rev J O'Shaughnessy, C.C., and other clergymen, were in attendance immediately Miss Barton took ill, and a doctor arrived with all speed, but was nevertheless too late to render any aid. The greatest sympathy is felt with the family of the deceased, whose kind and affable manner endeared her to a wide circle of friends. She had been ailing for a considerable time past, and was about being sent to England for the benefit of her health.

FISHERY CONSERVATORS.—The monthly meeting of the members of this body was held in the County Courthouse this morning, shortly after 11 o'clock, Mr J A Place in the chair. A report received from the fishery inspector, dated 5th March, 1888, was, on the suggestion of Alderman Counihan referred to the Bailiffs' Committee. The Chairman said he thought the Board ought to apply if possible to the different railway companies for statistics which would give them some assistance as to finding out the supply of fish from the river—whether it was falling off or not. After some discussion Alderman Counihan proposed the following resolution—"That the different railway companies be asked to give returns for the past fortnight, and we undertake to pay all scrivener expenses." Adopted. The Board then resolved themselves into a committee.—Adjourned.
