SIR,—Notwithstanding the large and increas-
ing number of charities to which at the present
time every person possessing the means is being
pressed to contribute, I feel that it is scarcely
necessary for me to apologise for bringing before
the charitably disposed people in this county
the claims of the Royal National Hospital for
Consumption for Ireland. There can be no
question in the mind of any thinking person that
not one only but many hospitals for this purpose
are badly wanted in Ireland. There is no room
for doubt that the one which has been already
established has done, and is doing, immense
good; and there is, unfortunately, no room for
the assumption that the people of this county
have done, or are doing, all that they can
reasonably be called upon to do to support it.

During the last few years I have collected
from a few friends in the County Limerick about
£22 annually, and as far as I can judge from the
published subscription list about £10 has been
subscribed independently.

From the report of last year (a copy of which
I will gladly send to anyone of your readers who
desires it) I gather that 14 patients from this
county were admitted, and remained under
treatment for an average of three months, with
the most beneficial results. It is obvious that
this privilege calls for a largely increased
subscription on our part, and it is to bring about
this desirable result that I solicit the assistance
of those of your readers who are not at present
on the list of subscribers.

I shall be glad to receive subscriptions how-
ever small, and should be very much obliged if
those who cannot afford to contribute them-
selves would bring this appeal to the notice of
any of their friends who may be more fortunately
situated.
