

This set of vestments was used in the penal days for the celebration of Holy Mass in the residence of the O'Flaherty family, of Galway, and the Islands of Arran. It passed by marriage to the family of The O'Donnellan Blake Fosters, of Kilfenora, County Clare, and it is still treasured by this family. (Mrs. O'Donnellan Blake Foster).

53. THE BELL OF CASHEL.

Found in Cashel in 1849. A 9th century bell similar to Bell of Lough Lene in National Museum. (Limerick City Museum).

54. THE SINGLAND BELL : c. XI Cent.

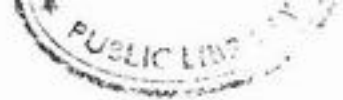
It was found at Singland, just outside the city, which St. Patrick visited, and from near which he is said to have preached to the men of Thomond, probably 10th century. (Limerick City Museum).

55. TENTH CENTURY BELL : X Cent.

Similar to Singland Bell ; purchased recently in South County Limerick. (R. Herbert).

56. SEVENTEENTH CENTURY BELL.

This bell, as the inscription tells, was made for the Franciscan House at Nenagh by Father Eugene Callanan in the time of James II. Father Callanan was then Guardian at Nenagh. Inscription : " R. Eug. Callanan, procuravit pro Conventu St. Fran., ——— A.D., 1689." (Lent by the Sisters of Mercy, Nenagh,
