Sale Of Surplus

Dried Wheat

The following statement has today been issued by the Government Information Bureau on behalf of the Department of Agriculture:- Surplus dried wheat of the 1960 crop will shortly be placed on sale through an Bord Gráin at a basic price of £22 per ton, delivered to purchaser's nearest railhead, for minimum lots of ten tons. A detailed announcement regarding sale arrangements will be made by An Bord Gráin in the immediate future.

It is not intended to grant licences for the importation of feeding barley in the period up to next harvest.

Licensing Of Bulls

The following statement has today been issued by the Government Information Bureau on behalf of the Department of Agriculture:-

Applications for licences for bulls calved during the period 1st January to 30th June, 1960, should now be made. Application forms may be obtained at Garda Siochána stations and Post Offices and also from the Department of Agriculture and County Committees of Agriculture. Applications made after 31st January will be subject to additional fees. The inspection of the bulls will take place at approved centres (including shows and sales) in February and March. Persons keeping bulls of the prescribed age without licences are liable to prosecution and, on conviction, to a penalty of £20.

U.S. DIESEL ENGINES FOR C.I.E.

Two American diesel engines are due to be unloaded at Alexandra Basin, Dublin, this afternoon for C.I.E. They are the first of 15 such engines which the company has on order, and are to be the first American engines purchased in the history of C.I.E. or its forerunner companies.

A C.I.E. spokesman told a 'Leader' reporter that this is all part of the drive to further dieselise the rail system and that these new American engines, following their necessary acceptance tests, go into operation in the general railway network, and will be used for the transport of both passengers and freight.

NEED FOR SAILING

TICKETS

British Railways announced yesterday that sailing tickets are still available for all controlled sailings from Rosslare Harbour and from Dun Laoghaire up to and including Saturday, January 7, 1961.

Passengers returning to Britain after the Christmas holidays are again exhorted to apply for them, as embarkation at these ports cannot be guaranteed unless they hold valid sailing tickets.

Next Friday's Consecration Of New Protestant Bishop

A considerable number of lay and clerical representatives from Limerick and Kerry will be in Christchurch Cathedral, Dublin, on Friday next for the Consecration of Very Rev. Dr. Wyse-Jackson, Dean of Cashel, as Protestant Bishop of Limerick. He will be enthroned in St. Mary's Cathedral, Limerick, on Thursday, January 26th.

Dr. Wyse-Jackson, who formerly served as Rector of St Michael's Parish, Limerick, from 1940 to 1943, will be consecrated by the Archbishop of Dublin, Most Rev. Dr. G. O. Simms. There will be a number of assisting prelates, including the Bishops of Ossory, Cashel, Cork, and Killaloe, and Right Rev. Dr. E. C. Hodges, retired Bishop of Limerick.

The preacher will be Very Rev. H. R. McAdoo, Ph.D., Dean of Cork. The Chapters of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin; Christchurch, Dublin; Cashel Cathedral and St. Mary's Cathedral, Limerick, will all attend in robes.

Dean of Cashel since 1943, Dr. Wyse-Jackson has outstanding academic attainments. He secured his

degree of Doctor of Literature (D.Litt.) from Trinity College, Dublin, for his thesis on Jonathan Swift. He is also a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) as well as having the distinction of being a Barrister-at-Law (B.L.). He is a member of the Royal Irish Academy. His forthcoming consecration and enthronement will bring fresh honours as a Doctor of Divinity (D.D.).

He has written a number of legal text books and some theological works which have earned for him a wide reputation.

His election some months ago to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Right Rev. Dr. E. C. Hodges, was received most favourably in Limerick.



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
