LIMERICK BOAT CLUB 6th ANNUAL REPORT

Immediately on the opening of the season a pair of tub fours were ordered from William Biffin, jr., of Bedford, which arrived in June and gave every satisfaction as to their build and finish. Later on in the year a large number of your members presented the club with an eight-oared boat.

Two pair oared pleasure boats were purchased early in the season and specially reserved for the accommodation of ladies.

Your committee used every exertion to procure a trainer, but were unsuccessful; however your Captain with unabated self-denial did everything in his power to create amongst your members an interest in rowing. We have good reason to congratulate and thank him on the result, as at all times he had crews at work and boats never unoccupied.

The scratch matches for which your committee gave prizes were as heretofore held during the year and were most successful and well attended. In reference to this we must not omit to acknowledge our indebtedness to Col. Catty and the officers of the 46th Regiment for their kindness in giving their band for those evenings, which in a great measure contributed to the pleasure and entertainment of those attending.

Another source of amusement to your members and their friends was the sailing matches for a £20 challenge cup, very generously presented by your vice-president, Joseph Matterson, Esq. There was a race every fortnight between 5th July and 20th September, each

of which were well contested, and in the end the cup was won by Blanche, owned by Mr. T. H. Kenny and Mr. N. A. Brophy.

There was also a steersman's prize presented by Messrs. R. Wallace & Co., which was won by Mr. Fry, and a second prize contributed by the yacht owners, won by the Swift, owned by Mr. J. D. Cahill.

The Limerick Annual Regatta was held under your auspices last year and was eminently successful and gave general satisfaction.

Your captain entered crews for Limerick Annual Regatta, Galway, Castleconnell and Killaloe Regattas, at each of which prizes were secured.

With reference to Killaloe Regatta, your committee recommended that in future you should enter no crew unless you were credibly assured the conduct of the regatta was under authorised and responsible management.
