One of Limerick's best known rowing men Mr. ertie Wixtid has received a double honour in recent weeks. On October 23 he was elected a vicepresident of the Irish Amateur Rowing Union and only six days later on October 29 he was elected president of Limerick Boat Club. He has elected been a member of the executive of the I.A.R.U. since last year.

In his new office he will be representing Munster interests in the I.A.R.U. The other provincial appointments to. the vice-presidency are Mike Cavanagh, Connacht; Victor Cavanagh, Connacht; Victor Crawford, Ulster; and Mike Johnson, Leinster.


