A RECENT sponsored "row" raised £1,000 for Limerick Boat Club, it was disclosed at its annual dinner in the clubhouse the first to be held there for on Saturseveral years day night last.

But the heavy Government tax on equipment was criticised by the club president, Mr. Martin Connery, who pointed out that the cost of a boat could be raised considerably by VAT.

A fashion show was held in the club premises, the first ever to be held there, on Monday night of this week, in an effort to raise funds. Proposing the toast to Ireland, Mr. Connery, declared: "Looking at the different age groups here tonight, from the younger to the more senior members, I have no fear for the future. We have been 113 years on the water, without case, and looking at the attendance tonight we will be many years more on the water."

Encouragement

He went on: "We have one of the youngest committees in the history of the club, and the encouragement that they are getting from the older members is very heart-warming."

But he commented: "Every year, I have asked the Government and I will ask them again, to help rowing not with finance but with fairness.

"If we buy a boat in England, we have to pay £6,000 sterling, but when we get it here, it costs us over £9,000 because of Government taxation. We have to pay £150 each for oars.

"We are finding it harder and harder to raise money for equip-

harder to raise money for equipment."

He said that, on the following Monday night, there would be a fashion show in the clubhouse, in order to help raise funds—the first ever in the history of the club.

Proposing the toast to Limerick Boat Club, vice president, Mr. Paddy McKenna, said: "We are 113 years young. I have been involved in the boat club for a long time, and it is a long time indeed since I have seen such enthusiasm. "John Delaney and the other young members have a lot to do with the success of our new kitchen outside, and if we keep going on the water as we are going on land, there is no fear for Limerick Boat Club."

As an aside, he remarked: "I must congratulate Charlie O'Connor, life vice-president, who has been elected president of Castletroy Golf Club tonight."

In a brief address, before proposing the toast to the crews, Mr. Tony Barry, vice president, congratulated the incoming captain, Mr. Niall O'Brien, wishing him the best for the coming season.
"He told me that he has 12 novices and several crews in training, at the moment, and I hope he does well," he remarked. He extended his thanks to Mr. Desmond O'Malley, T.D., former

Minister for Industry and Energy, who was absent that evening, for his efforts on behalf of the oarsmen to have a pass opened for boats at the salmon weir crossing the river from the Distillery to the Island

tions there.

He commented, to some cheers:
"If we had a pass by the weir, it would save us having to go up by Athlunkard!"

Mr. Tynne paid a particular tribute to Mr. Denis O'Shaughnessy, himself a member of Athlunkard, who had, he said, done wonderful work on the columns of the Limerick Leader to promote rowing in Limerick, all of it with great fairness to all the clubs.

He also welcomed Mr. Christie Madigan, "a great trier", and the Press generally.
