Limerick Boat Club honours Dick Roche

IT WAS Dick Roche's night: the annual dinner of Limerick Boat Club his 50th marked anniversary of mem-bership - he is a life vice-president – with the presentation of a silver salver

And then it was speeches of tribute to his half-century of dedicated service, not only to club activities (he started as an oarsman) but to rowing generally, as a stalwart of Limerick Regatta Committee.

The honour fell to life-long colleague – also a life vice-president – Mr. Brendan Hanrahan to speak his praises, in sum: "A life-long friend, a true oarsman and a very knowledgable one".

Captain

He added: "There are not many clubs where you have members 50 years in the club. He joined in 1936 and rowed for five seasons, winning maiden and junior races; he started coaching in 1942 to 1944 before being elected captain in 1945.

"He had five wins at Limerick Regatta, and in 1947, he was appointed the coach to the maidens and be their cox also – he was unbeaten that year – Limerick, Galway, Cork, Waterford and Limerick Head of the River".

The functions at the club premises, was attended by many notables: Mayor Pat Kennedy, District Justice Michael Reilly, Supt. Michael Creaton and representatives from the I.A.R.U. and sister clubs in Limerick and Castleconnell.

"In 1948, Dick was coach to the juniors, winning in Limerick, Killaloc, and Galway. In 1949, he had wins in Limerick, Killaloc, Galway and Dublin.
"On the administrative side, Dick was on the Regatta Committee, on and off, for 30 years, starting as an umpire and a judge. He was a member of the dance committee for many nights at the Stella Ballroom, and on Friday nights at the skating rink.
"He was president three times and was elected vice-president for life. In 1965, he brought the four Limerick clubs together and formed a committee to organise and obtain the services of a professional coach from England—the money was raised by the clubs and the I.A.R.U. In 1970 – the centenary year – he was elected treasurer of the club, a very big undertaking that year.

"Dick also introduced a 'fours' league in order to provide an early season rowing competition for two years with Paddy Treacey of St. Michael's. He introduced and ran '45' drives in the club and was elected honorary bar secretary – he still holds the office". Mr. Hanrahan concluded: "In

the 115 years we have been here, and never once off the water, he was one of the greatest overall Limerick Boat Club men of all time?

Club president, Mr. Paddy McKenna, who proposed the toast to "Ireland", formally handed the inscribed salver to Mr. Roche.

Replying, Mr. Roche said that it was essential that crewmen should not row for merely a season or two, but remain on and persist until success was finally achieved.

He advocated that the club get back down to the fundamentals of rowing. "The oarsmen are Limerick Boat Club", he declared, "but I would like to see a little more discipline among the junior members – rowing is not a one-man sport: it takes four plus one to man a boat".

Mayor Kennedy, who also joined in the tributes, and also gave a history of the club, said that it was a Mayor of Limerick, William Spillane, who was a founder member of "Limerick": three other Mayors, Hall, Bate and Counihan, were members of the club in its first ten years, 1870 to 1880.

He said that on February 3, 1870, at the Arheneum building, a meeting was held in the reading room where it was decided to form a Limerick Boat Club: £50 was raised plus £10 from the then mayor, and Limerick Harbour Commissioners granted a site the

same year. On April 4, 1870, Mayor Spillane laid the first stone.

Spectators

A total of 15,000 people attended the first two regattas, and the spectators were treated to such extraordinary fare that the success of the Limerick Regatta was assured. The club was Limerick's first to instal an indoor tank for training.

assured. The club was Limerick's first to instal an indoor tank for training.

The club had many notables, such as Bruce Murray, who was its secretary for over 50 years. On the occasion of his golden jubilee, the late Alfie Goodwin presented a new president's badge of office in 1956; a later president, Jim Sheahan, presented the clain, on which the names of the presidents since 1870 were inscribed.

Mr. Tony Tynne, life vice-president, also paid tribute to Dick Roche. Proposing the toast to the club, he gave insights into its history over 115 years.

He said: "Limerick Boat Club was founded in the library of the Athenaeum Building in February 1870. Its aims were rowing in its various phases, sailing and Rob Roy canoeing and to enable those interested in the above brands of sport to meet together and enjoy social reunion; the colours of the club to be black and white.

"In 1870 Limerick Harbour Board gave us this present site on Wellesley Pier. Our first boath-

ouse built here in that year cost £81. 4s. and it was big enough to hold fours, pairs and pleasure boats. The slipway was built under the guidance of William Molloy, civil eng., at a cost of £47. 17s. and the total expenditure for the year 1870 amounted to £253 and income was £216, which left the club £37 in the red, which debt worried the committee at that time, so today's committee take heart.

This year

"In 1880 this clubhouse was built and no major renovations have taken place until this year. We in Limerick Boat Club will place on public record our thanks to AnCO management and staff for the first-class work in restoring our boathouse and clubhouse, you could say both buildings have almost been replaced totally, particularly the clubhouse.

"To the members may I say your committee worked very hard in 1985, 50 meeting were held (a club record) and I know you will give them every support for their ventures during the coming year to help reduce the club debt.

"Tonight we have paid tribute to Dick Roche who has reached his 50th year as a member, one of the great boat men in our 115 year history and a man who has always led by example. And on a personal note, Dick, may I thank you for introducing me to Limerick Boat Club 28 years ago.

"William Murray, Archibald Murray, Niall Brophy, T. H. Denny, Michael Neiland, Tom Egan, David Tidmarsh, M.
