A meeting of the Privy Council was held on
Thursday in the Council Chamber, Dublin
Castle, when the Right Hon. Lord Justice
Fitzgibbon was sworn a Lord Justice for the
Government of Ireland during the absence of
the Lord Lieutenant.

a respected and highly esteemed lady, which

Wiltshire.

Captain Berkley Vincent of the Royal
Artillery has arrived at his father's residence,
Summerhill, Castleconnell, after 15 months'
active Service as Attache with the Japanese 1st
Army. Captain Vincent, before leaving Japan
passed an examination at Tokio in the Japanese
language.

The obsequies of the late Rev. Canon Carey,
P.P., were solemnised on Thursday at Barefield
R.C. Parish Church, whither the remains were
removed from Cappa, Ennis, on Wednesday
evening. The Most Rev. Dr. Fogarty, Lord
Bishop of Killaloe, presided at the Solemn Office
and Requiem Mass. There was a very large
attendance of the clergy and general public.

The Lords Commissioners of H. M. Treasury
have appointed Mr. Guy Stephenson to be

to the late Mr. Angus Lewis.

A goosherd, who got drunk at Wigt
over seven years ago, was yesterday sent
to goal for fourteen days' hard labour for
offence.

A well-dressed man, apparently a stranger,
was seen to fall over the Shakespeare Club
Dover, yesterday morning. When picked up
he was dead, the body being much mutilated.

About 150 residents in Sheffield have again
refused to pay the education rate, and sum-
mons are being issued against them. They
include an Alderman and two Councillors.

A telegram from San Sebastian announced
that the Infante Fernando, son of the late
Princess of the Asturias, and heir presumptive
to the throne, died early yesterday morning.

Mr. Robert W. Criswell, editor of the "New
Yorker," a society weekly, committed suicide
last night by throwing himself in front of
a train on the new electric underground railway.

The 21st Middlesex Rifle Volunteers, who
went into camp at Worthing on Saturday, are not
to have their hair close cropped, so as to be
able to present a smart and soldierly
appearance.

In the House of Lords yesterday,
Churches (Scotland) Bill was passed through
Committee without amendment. The Royal
Assent was given to several public and private
Bills.

In the House of Commons yesterday,
Unemployed Bill, after the adoption of amend-
ments moved by the President of the Local
Government Board, passed through Committee.
Several Irish Bills were withdrawn.

At a meeting of the Football Association
Council in London a Welsh International
ward was, in consequence of an accusation
against him in connection with the Manchester
City and Ashton League match, suspended
from playing next season.

An extensive strike is threatened in
Western Australian Goldfields, owing to
reduction of wages for fitters, turners,
blacksmiths. Several mines have already
closed.

Two workmen named Aarbury and Si-
mon while attempting to climb Jungfrau, lost
way, and fell to the Gressen Glacier below.
The bodies have been recovered, and
frightfully mangled.

The tea outturn in Cachar Sylhet, the D
Terai, and Darjiling last month was poor.
Assam it was normal. In all the district
immediate prospects are fair. The weather
moderate.

Henry Atkins, mate of the steamer,
trading between Guernsey and Liverpool,
between the vessel and the quay at Guernsey
during Tuesday night and was drowned.
He was a native of Manchester.

Jesse Smith, a driver, in the Royal
