CAHIRGUILLAMORE AFFRAY

FUNERAL OF THE VICTIMS

Sad Scenes at the Cathedral

Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated at St John's Cathedral at 10 o'clock yesterday morning for the repose of the souls of the five young men who lost their lives at Cahirguillamore House on Sunday night. There was an immense congregation present, and all joined devoutly in the impressive ceremony. The relatives of the deceased were also present and wept bitterly during the Mass. The coffins containing the remains of the deceased—Edward Moloney, Daniel Sheehan, Martin Conway, Henry Wade, and John Quinn—were placed in front of the high altar. The celebrant of the Mass was Rev S J Connolly, Adm St John's; Rev T Hogan, Pres St Munchin's College, was deacon, and Rev Jas O'Carroll, O C, St John's, sub-deacon. Rev T J M Namara, O C, do, was master of ceremonies. The funerals started at one o'clock for Grange Cemetery and were accompanied by large numbers of the general public.

Removal of Police Victim

On Wednesday morning the remains of the late Constable Alfred O Hogden, R I O, who was fatally wounded in the Bruff raid, were brought in a police lorry from Bruff to Kilmallock, and conveyed by train for interment in London. When the coffin containing the remains was being placed in the van at the Railway Station passengers and others were ordered to remove their hats and caps by armed police.

The Prisoners

From inquiries made in official circles to-day, we learn that the military inquiry regarding the prisoners taken at Cahirguillamore House, is not yet ended. The prisoners were removed from the New Barracks yesterday, and are at present in the County Jail.
