Railway Store Raided

An official report says:—At 8 p.m. on the 3rd Inst., five masked and armed men entered the railway goods store at Cloughjordan, Co Tipperary, and "held up" a porter and a clerk, who were on duty in the store at the time. They went through the goods in the store, and removed one bag consigned from a Belfast firm to a lady residing in the Cloughjordan district. They cut open the bag and scattered the contents about the railway yard. The motive for this outrage is attributed to the present Sinn Fein boycott of Belfast goods.

BIG SWOOP

During Saturday and Sunday morning military and police effected 280 arrests in East Limerick, all those arrested being released after identification.

THE MAYORALTY

It is understood that the Mayor, Councillor O'Gallagher, will not seek re-election to the Mayoral chair this year. Three new candidates are said to be on the field. The election will take place on Monday, the 24th Inst.

"An improvement in the fall in prices will be substantial," said the manager of a large wholesale warehouse in London to a "Daily Post" representative. "Wholesale prices for hams and bacon are to be reduced on January 17th, and this fall will certainly be quickly reflected in the retail shops. I am not prepared to say what will be the extent of the drop in prices, but it will make the worried housewife smile. Prices for imported bacon will be the first to fall, and the drop is sure to be reflected to English and Irish produce. There are indications of a break in the prices of some other foods, and if the present mild weather continues English eggs must certainly become cheaper."

DECREE FOR POSSESSION

At Limerick Quarter Sessions, before County Court Judge Pigott, John P. Hartigan sought possession of No 7 Davie street from Ellen Collopy.

Mr M. Binchy, B.L. (instructed by Mr P. E. O'Donnell) appeared for plaintiff; and Mr J. H. Moran, solicitor, for defendant.

His Honor made a decree for possession, Mr Hartigan agreeing to relet the top story of the premises to the defendant.

PERMIT FOR FAIR REFUSED

Owing to the refusal of the authorities to grant the necessary permit, the Mitchelstown fair, a most important one, which was to take place on Monday, had to be abandoned. Although the ordinary markets were previously stopped, at least as far as assemblies in public were concerned, it was hoped the fair would be allowed to take place. This action imposes a great hardship, on business men, farmers, and the general community, to say nothing of consumers across the Channel.
