The firms involved are engaged in various export-orientated industrial activities, including the manufacture of computerised machinery, portable soldering irons, micro-processor development systems and nortion-packed ment systems and portion-packed

Commenting on the venture capital agreements Mr. Tom Carroll, executive director of the Innovation Centre, said that the significant investment are a vote of confidence in the value and growth potential of the type of industrial projects being promoted and assisted by the Centre. "Our 'venture market' initiative linking sources of venture capital with those firms requiring funds led to this breakthrough, and our current list of clients throughout the country includes twelve other projects which will be introduced to venture capitalists within the next twelve months," Mr. Carroll said.
