COLISEUM — Limerick's only cinema in O'Connell St. has been sold and will re-open as a factory.

This announcement last week ended another chapter in local entertainment history.

Opened in 1917 as a theatre, it was at that time one of the leading show-places in the South of Ireland, playing to capacity business nightly, with audiences applauding the great musical comedies of the period.

And one of its brightest stars was Lena Gough (daughter of proprietor Michael Gough), whose wonderful soprano voice captivated her listeners with its never-to-be forgotten beauty as she played the leads in such memorable successes as "The Belle Of New York," "Florodora," "Miss Hook Of Holland" and countless others.

She is now living in London with her doctor husband and family, and her thoughts must have raced back to those glorious days as the news reached her that the Coliseum's days had ended.

As a cinema, its career was equally spectacular, with the idols of the "silent" and "talkie" eras enchanting moviegoers with their make-believe.

It was here that Rudolph Valentino, Ronald Colman, the Talmadges, Gloria Swanson, Charlie Chaplin and Mary Pickford (to name an infinitesimal few) captured the imaginations of filmgoers.

It was on the Coliseum stage, too, that Anew McMaster made his Limerick debut just two and a half decades ago, and off-hand I can recall such brilliant compan-

the business when the projectors had to be turned by hand. He was a veritable mine of information and had many interesting and amusing yarns to tell about the business.

Jim Byrne would show me treasured stills of great films of the past, as well as priceless orchestral parts for the many big "silent" epics shown when the Coliseum had one of the finest pit orchestras in the country.

Finally, I can recall proprietor Thomas Gough always standing at the foot of the balcony staircase between performances, anxious to hear the reactions of his patrons to his hand-picked programmes.

Farewell Coliseum, no longer will you re-echo to the voices of Limerick's leading talent or to the adventures of Hollywood's greatest actors and actresses.

Your projectors are silent, the screen is faded, the curtain is down, the show is ended . . .
