6-screen cinema complex for city

LIMERICK COULD shortly have its first multi cinema complex, courtesy of the Ward-Anderson Group who are owners of the Carlton and Central Studio and retain an interest in the Royal Cinema, which closed last year.

As part of their plan to revitalise the cinema industry in Ireland, Ward-Anderson, the largest exhibitors in the country, are to close a number of existing cinemas throughout the country and build multi screens instead.

It is understood that they have a six-screen complex

planned for Limerick.

Mr. Leo Ward, a director
of the group and who has
strong Limerick connections, was not available for
comment this Thursday.
However, a spokesperson in
his office did confirm that
they had big plans for
Limerick.

In the 'seventies Limerick had seven screens. With the city restricted to two cinemas it has meant a backlog of films awaiting release in Limerick. This is due partially to retentions.

It is not known yet if Ward-Anderson will move to a new location or develop one of their existing cinemas, possibly the Carlton.

It has been reported that they will close their six cinemas in Cork and move to a new site on the suburbs.
