DISASTROUS THUNDERSTORM.

New York, Wednesday.
 A thunderstorm of unusual violence burst over
 new York yesterday afternoon for a quarter of an
 hour. One terrified clap followed another in
 quick and deafening succession, and a heavy down-
 pour of rain accompanied the storm. The light-
 ning did much damage in the city and vicinity,
 and wrought even worse havoc in Brooklyn,
 where warehouses full of cotton, owned by the
 New York Warehousing Company, were struck by
 lightning and burned, the loss being estimated at
 100,000 dollars. Among the buildings struck by
 lightning in New York and slightly damaged is
 St Mary's Catholic Church in Old Castle Garden.
 Great damage was also caused in the battery park
 and to the buildings in the vicinity.
