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SHOCKING FATALITIES.

Mangled Body found on Ennis Line.

This morning, about seven o'clock, Thomas Moore, a milesman on the Ennis line, discovered the body of a woman lying between the rails at a place called Ballygreeman, between Longpavement and Cratloe. The deceased, who had not been identified up to noon, was apparently a farm servant, and evidently had been walking along by the line some time last night, and at the place mentioned where the path is very narrow between the track and the wall, she was caught by a passing train and dragged along for a distance of seventy-six yards. The body was horribly mangled, the skull being battered, the left foot mangled and broken, the right arm lacerated, and other injuries inflicted, which must have caused instantaneous death. The boot of the right foot was cut off, but strange to say the limb itself was uninjured. The milesman at once reported the gruesome discovery at Caherdavin Police Barracks, and Sergeant Power and his men are actively making inquiries with a view to the identity of the deceased. The body was lying with the head facing in the Limerick direction.

BODY IDENTIFIED.

This afternoon the body was identified as that of Kate Connell, 24, single, servant of John Frost, of Meelick.

An inquest will be held at the Workhouse on Monday at 11 o'clock.

SAD RAILWAY FATALITY.

A very sad fatal accident occurred about eight o'clock last night in the shunting yard at Limerick Terminus. It would appear that the light engine after working in the train from Sligo was proceeding to the Locomotive Shed, when a pointsman, named Michael Connery was knocked down by the engine and received such injuries that he died almost immediately. The poor man had been sheltering himself in an archway of a goods store close to which the line runs, and it is supposed that he slipped out on the track and thus met his death. Another statement is that two engines were approaching in different directions and that one of them was not observed by the deceased at the moment. Connery had some forty years' service on the railway, and for a long period was a pointsman at Limerick. He was a most faithful and trusted employe. He was about 65 years of age, a widower, and residing at Dixon's Lane, Carey's Road.

THE INQUEST.

At the inquest which was held by Mr. Corner DeCourcy at the Railway Hotel this afternoon it appeared that the driver of the 8 p.m. Nenagh train, Thomas Woodhouse, saw a man moving from the wall of the goods store, and one of the buffers of the engine behind him struck him. He gave the alarm, and both engines immediately pulled up.

William Meade, driver of the other engine, deposed that he was going back to the shed with his engine from the station; he blew his whistle and got the green light from the loco cabin, which was the sign that the road was clear. Witness at once stopped his engine when the alarm was given by the Nenagh driver, and they found the deceased between the rails.

Dr. Coffey deposed that death was due to shock.

The jury returned a verdict of accidental death.

THE CHURCH.

Much regret will be felt at the announcement of the serious illness of the Rev. Canon Terence, Mus. D. He is unable to transact any business, and is not allowed to answer any communications.

The curacy of Kilkenny is still vacant. It is a most important post, as there is attached to it the Minor Canonry of the Cathedral and other important offices, the income being about £200 per annum.

The Bishop of Derry has appointed the Rev. Canon Kennedy, Rector of Raymochy to be Dean of Raphoe.

After nearly 55 years' ministry in the Church of Ireland, the Very Rev. Abraham Dawson A.M., Dean of Dromore, passed away on Monday last. He was 79 years old.

To-morrow, the fourth Sunday in November has been appointed by the General Assembly Committee on Temperance as "General Temperance Day," when special sermons will be preached in the churches and earnest appeals made for contributions towards the working expenses of the Committee.

ADULATION ABANDONED.

Dr. Dawson Burns' latest protest against the dedication of the Holy Bible (by its translators to King James I. has gained his point. The University Presses will not henceforward insist on the dedication being included in the authorised version. The dedication is (in the doctor's opinion) absolutely absurd and false. It eulogises King James for things which could in no case be attributed to him, and for 800 years the Bible has gone on addressing him in the most preposterous language. The King was a poltroon and a coward, and tried his best to rob the English people of their liberties.
