LOCAL children around the Westbury area in Corbally are climbing the new 15-metre Telecom Eireann tower near the estate.

And parents concerned that there may be an accident want the tower to be sealed off completely.

The tower, which will eventually house aerials for the mobile phone network, was built on a Telecom site on the edge of the estate.

It was built under a special exemption regulation which allowed work to go ahead without going through the normal planning process.

"There was no consultation. We just woke up one morning and there it was. Work had commenced," said Moire Dillon.

"Children climb it. They go to the top as a dare, and shout and scream when they get up it," he said.

She said that meetings with Telecom had failed to get any satisfactory resolution for the residents.

Tom Geary, one of the leaders of the Anti-Transmitter Campaign, also claimed that the tower is dangerous.

"There is a major risk, as it is being climbed regularly by young people. It has become known as the Westbury Tree House. Telecom say they are going to put a fence around it topped by barbed wire, but kids will get over that."

He said that the residents had a number of other objections to the tower, including that it was devaluing their property, that there would be a health risk from the radiation when it begins transmitting, and that it is an eyesore in an otherwise well developed estate.

He added that he thought that the decision to site the mast in Westbury was taken in Dublin.

Telecom classify the site as being in Athlunkard, and Mr Geary said that, perhaps they thought they were putting it in a rural setting.

"We accept that Telecom need to develop their services, but they could have chosen a site less densely residential for their transmitter," he said.

The Anti-Transmitter Campaign will meet Health Minister, Michael Noonan, shortly to discuss their fears of radiation health risk when the transmitter begins broadcasting, and will step up their campaign to get Telecom to reconsider the siting of the controversial mast.
