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III IN night was the Duke of Argyll, Ha declared that no Government in history had been so corrupt as that of Mr Gladstone's. There was "nothing that had not been put up to anotion to gain a few votes." "The explanation of Mr Gladstone's sudden conversion to Home Rule," said his Grace, "was to be traced to Mr Parnell's policy of worrying and obstructing the House of Commons, and making it ridiculous in the eyes of foreign nations, and to the chance that offered of making a dishonourable alliance with the Irish party, and the Prime Minister's one object throughout the campaign, and the object of his followers, who had followed him with abject servility, had been to take advantage of the universal ignorance that had prevailed upon the subject." The debating power in the Lords is all on one side, nor did subsequent Gladstonian speakers succeed in mending the poor and puny argumentative opening of Lord Spencer.

> THE Kilrush people got it into their heads quite recently, on some reports that nobody seemed to be aware of but themselves, that a guardship was about being placed on the Shannon, and accordingly worked with a will-and for which they deserve every credit-in order that Scattery might be selected as the place of anchorage. Considering the fact that the forts on the river have been all dismantled, it seems an extraordinary thing that the Lords of the Admiralty do not, in the interests of the public service to use a stereotyped phrase—place a guardship on the Shannon. Independent of the advantage the vessel would be to the people residing in the vicinity of the station, wherever that might be, one would imagine that, under the circumstances we have mentioned at the outset, it would be a prudent step for the authorities to comply with the representations made to them from various localities along the Shannon. However, from the unfavourable reply given by the Admiralty to the Foynes Guardship Comm thee so far back as the month of Jane, we were under the impression that some considerable time must clapse before a guardship is seen on the Saannen, notwithstanding the rather confident opinion to the contrary prevailing at Kilrush. In this we are borne out by the correspondence read at the last meeting of the Town Commissioners. The Lorde of the Admiralty "are unable at the present time to alter the stations of H.M. ships on the coast of Ireland." But we are promised that if the arrangements of the service are changed at any future time "the position of Scattery roadstead will receive careful attention." The proceedings that have taken place both at Foynes and Kilrush during the past six months have had the effect of pressing this very important subject home to the authorities, and we have every hope that eventually the movement will be successful, Better late than never.
