

# Gardai appeal to mother of infant to come forward

LIMERICK gardaí have made another appeal to the mother of a dead baby girl found in a black plastic bag to come forward, as she may be in need of medical attention. Supt Tony Kenneally, Henry Street station, who is heading the investigation, said they were concerned for her health, both mental and physical.

One of the possibilities was that the mother was young. "No arrangements will be made for the baby until the investigation has been completed and both the identity of the baby and her mother established," he said. Sgt Anne Marie McMahon said the mother would be treated with compassion. "We are very concerned that she is in need of urgent medical attention and we'd like to help her as much as we can."

After the post-mortem by the Assistant State Pathologist, Dr Marie Cassidy, gardaí said it was not possible to say yet if the baby had been stillborn and further tests were required.

## Man killed in cliff fall named

A LIMERICK man killed at a Kerry beach has been named as Mr Aaron Keenihan (23) from Caherdavin. He was on holiday in Ballybunion when he fell 60 feet at 2 a.m. yesterday. Gardai believe he may have lost his balance on steps while going down to the strand known as the Men's Beach.

A post-mortem examination is to be held.

## Skerries bus route affected

BUS services from Skerries, Co Dublin, were running at half their capacity for three hours yesterday morning after unofficial action by four drivers. A spokesman for Dublin Bus said it was "an arbitrary decision to leave people, on a wet morning, on the side of the road". It is understood the drivers returned to work just after 9 a.m., after advice from their trade union representatives.

A spokesman for SIPTU, which represents the drivers along with the NBRU, said the action concerned facilities at the depot in Skerries, and the matter had been addressed.
