£3 MILLION BOOST FOR CITY ROADS AND BRIDGE

ROAD DEVELOP-MENTS in Limerick city have been allocated £3.156 million in the Budget.

The allocations were welcomed by Deputy Frank Prendergast who said that the £2¼ million grant for Mallow Street bridge meant that work could now proceed on the project.

£260,000 was also included for the roundabout at Watchhouse Cross, £130,000 for developments at Childers Road and Arthurs' Quay, and £100,000 for the Northern Ring Road.

Deputy Prendergast said that there was an obvious input by the Labour Party in the Budget which saw "a significant shift in the burden of
