DEATH OF A GLIN GENTLEMAN AT SHEERNESS.

The deepest regret prevails at Glin owing to the unexpected intelligence of the death on Tuesday of Dr. James Curry. The deceased, who was in the prime of life, was the fourth son of the late Mr. Curry, C.P.S., Glin. He had a distinguished collegiate career, and on obtaining his Degree at Edinburgh University, practised for some time in Wales, and finally settled down in Sheerness, where he soon attained to eminence in his profession. He leaves two young orphan children to mourn the loss of their parents—his wife having pre-deceased him by a couple of years.

£131 FOR A "WAVERLEY."
A first edition copy of "Waverley," in three volumes, was sold in London on Wednesday for £131. The books are uncut, still retain their original boards, and were published in Edinburgh in 1814. A letter from Burns, addressed to Mrs. Thomas Cambell, was sold for £12 5s.

LISTOWEL FAIR.
(From Our Own Correspondent.)

The fair of Listowel, held on Tuesday, though one of the old fairs, was disappointing both as regards supply of stock and attendance of buyers. Prices, too, showed a marked downward tendency as regards some classes. Business in the store department was practically nil, very few beasts changing hands, and in fact the bulk was not priced at all. APPOINTMENT OF D. STRICT NURSE.
Mr. Woulfe proposed that a midwife be appointed for the Bridgetown Dispensary District.
Mr. Skehan seconded the proposition.
After some discussion it was decided to advertise for a midwife for Bridgetown at a salary of £30 a year, the person appointed to live in the most central part of the district.

PARLIAMENT.

In the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Winston Churchill moved for leave to introduce a Bill to limit the duration of Parliaments to five years.
On a division, the motion was defeated by 239 votes to 175.
On the motion for the consideration of the Churches (Scotland) Bill, as amended in Committee, Mr. George White moved the omission of Clause 5, which enables the formula of subscription of the Church of Scotland to be altered with the consent of a majority of the presbyteries.
After a prolonged debate, there voted—For the retention of the clause, 270; against, 167; Government majority, 113.
The second reading of the Irish Education (Afflicted Children) Bill was then agreed to.

DEATH OF MRS. FITZMAURICE.

We regret to announce the death of Mrs. Fitzmaurice, which took place at her residence, Dock-road, this morning. The deceased lady, who was wife of Mr. J. Fitzmaurice, Harbour Master, had only been ailing a couple of days, and as such her demise came as a shock to her family and numerous friends. Possessed of a kindly and genial disposition, her loss, specially in the domestic circle, is an irreparable one, and deep sympathy is expressed with Mr. Fitzmaurice in his bereavement. As a mark of respect to her memory the vessels in the harbour have their flags at half mast. The deceased lady leaves a family of six young children to mourn her loss.

FAMILY SQUABBLE.

At the County Petty Sessions to-day, before Mr. Ffrench, R.M., a middle-aged woman, named Bridget Hynes, prosecuted a relative of hers, named Catherine Hynes, for assault, and there was a cross-case of a similar kind. The evidence adduced went to show that the parties, who reside at Pennywell, have been living on unfriendly terms for some time, and on the 21st of last month attacked one another. In the conflict they were assisted by other members of both families, and bruises and black eyes were the result of what was described as an unsightly tussle. Both women were bound to the peace.
