

GIVE O.N.E. DISPENSARY —O'DRISCOLL

Councillor Tim O'Driscoll has his way. Councillor O'Driscoll has signalled his intention to raise the issue at the next

meeting of Limerick City Health Committee.

"I intend to find out from the Health Board their future plans regarding the old

dispensary," he said.

Restoration

"The building, although in poor state at present,

could, in my view, be restored with Government grants and would be an ideal premises for the Organisation of National Ex-Servicemen in Limerick", said the now independent city councillor.

"The Limerick ONE Branch," he went on, "does not have its own premises at present.

"I believe that with Government aid and co-operation between the Health Board and Limerick Corporation, this building with its central location, could become the ideal premises for this worthy organisation."

Councillor O'Driscoll said that the members of the ONE had served this coun-

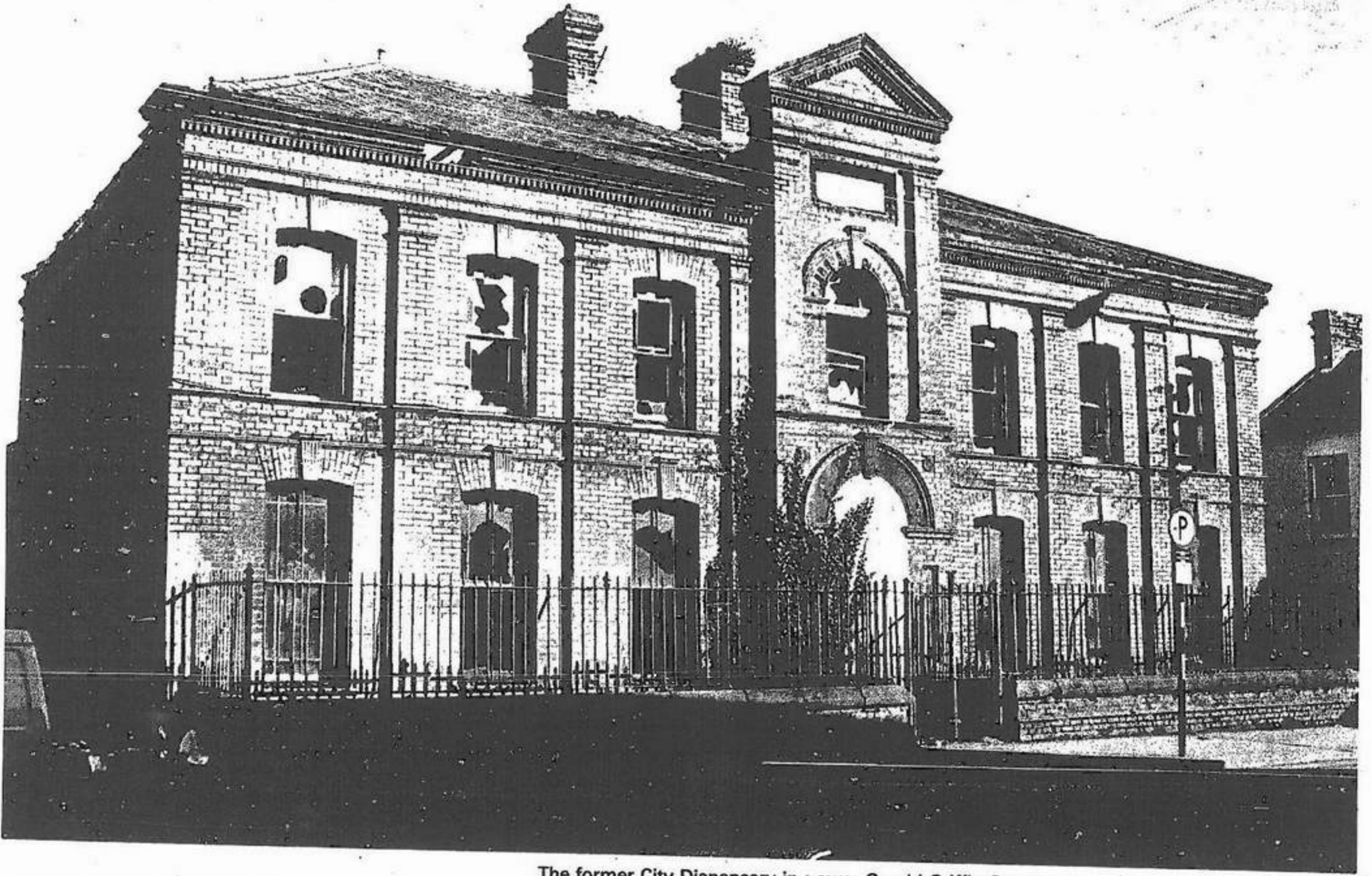
try with great distinction and their contribution to peacekeeping around the globe had been acknowledged universally.

"I feel," he said, "that we owe a debt of gratitude to our Servicemen."

Renewal

He hoped that the renovation of the old City Dispensary would receive special consideration in the new Urban renewal programme.

"All of us take for granted the sacrifices these ex-servicemen made for Ireland. Let us do something practical for them by providing premises where they can hold their meetings and socials," said Councillor O'Driscoll.

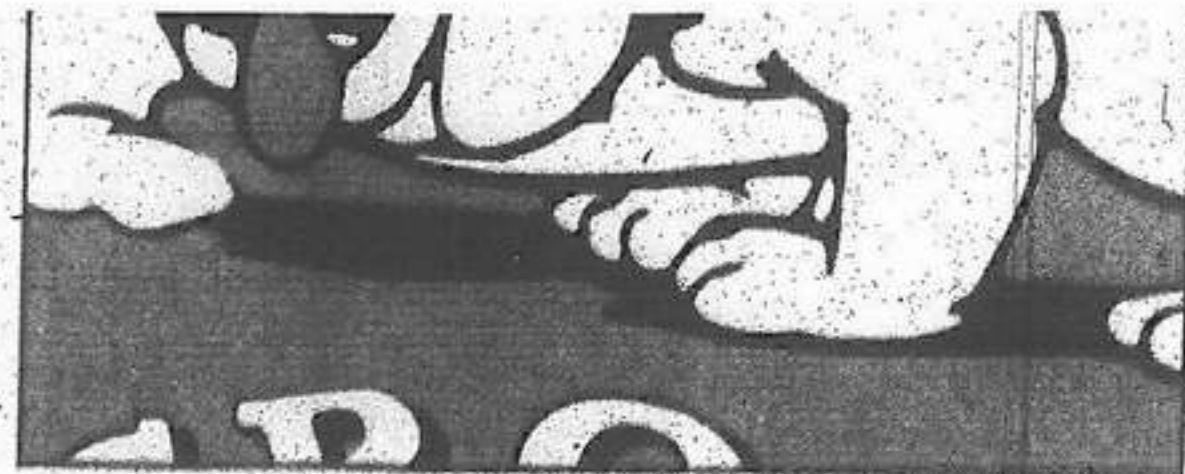

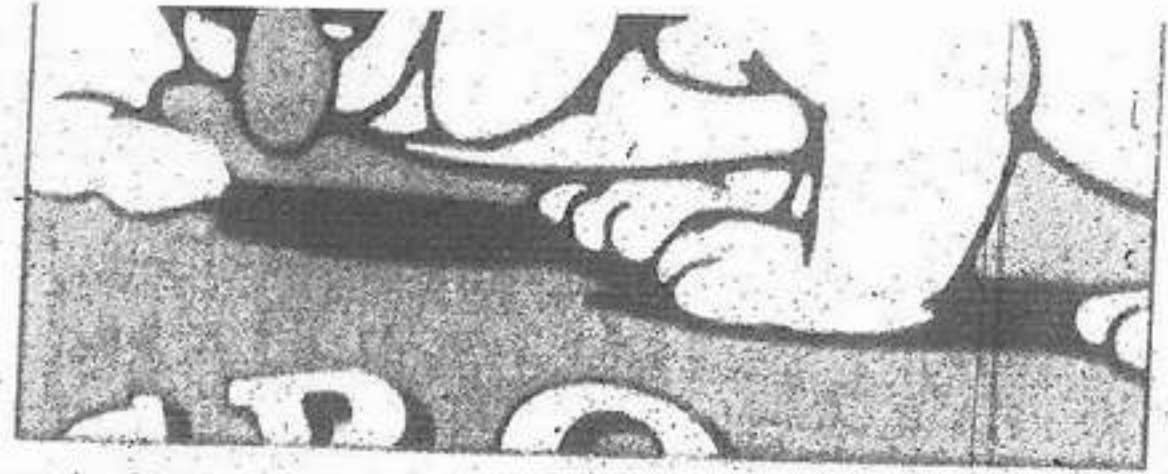
