

THE DRUMCOLLOGHER DISASTER.

Limerick Sympathy.

The Ven. J. T. Waller, Archdeacon of Limerick, has written to the Very Rev. Canon Begley as follows:

"In the absence from Limerick of the Right Rev. Dr. White, Bishop of Limerick, I am writing to express to you the deep sympathy we feel with you and those who have been bereaved so suddenly and in such a terrible manner. The tragedy has come as an awful shock to all, and I pray that the sufferers may be sustained by Divine Grace under this severe trial. If it is convenient for you to do so, I would be glad if you would convey our message of deep sympathy to them."

The City Board of Health at its meeting on Thursday night tendered deep sympathy with the relatives of the people who perished in the Drumcollogher cinema fire, and adjourned as a mark of respect.

At a special meeting of the Athlunkard Boat Club on Thursday night the following was adopted in silence—"That we desire to join in the universal expression of sympathy tendered to his Lordship the Bishop, the Very Rev Canon Begley, P.P., and the people of Drumcollogher in the awful catastrophe; we pray that God, the great Consoler, may solace the bereaved in their affliction, and help them to bear their heavy sorrow, which no words can assuage. That copies be sent to his Lordship the Bishop, Canon Begley, Fr. O'Callaghan, C.C., St. Patrick's, and the Press."

At a fully attended general meeting of the Limerick Typographical Society on Thursday night the members expressed themselves in feeling terms with the people of Drumcollogher in their terrible affliction. The most sincere sympathy was ordered to be communicated to Canon Begley, the members standing in silence. The meeting then adjourned.

At a special quarterly meeting of the Amalgamated Society of Woodworkers, held in the Mechanics' Institute yesterday, a vote of condolence was passed with the relatives of the Drumcollogher victims, and a copy of same ordered to be sent to the Very Rev. Canon Begley.

Limerick Teachers' Association has passed a resolution of deepest sympathy with Canon Begley and the relatives of the victims.

A Rugby football match, the first of the season, was held this evening at the Markets Field between Bohemians and Young Munster, the entire proceeds being devoted to the National Fund. The Mayor and members of the Corporation were present, as also the Boherbuoy Band.

Limerick County Council's Sympathy.

Statements Repudiated.

The meeting of the Limerick County Council was adjourned to-day as a mark of respect to the memory of the victims of the Drumcollogher cinema fire, and sincere sympathy was tendered to the relatives in their great sorrow.

The Chairman (Mr John Bourke), in moving the resolution and adjournment of the Council, said that Limerick was closely concerned in what he could not describe as other than a terrible calamity, too dreadful to contemplate. Every one of the people that perished belonged to the county, and it was hard to realise that they had met with such an untimely fate. Many of the poor victims were known to the members of the Council, which, if anything, helped to accentuate the regret they felt at such a visitation. He could not find words adequate to express regret at the disaster, but any material help the Council could give would be given generously by the members of that body.

The resolution was passed in respectful silence.

Mr John McCormack observed that it had been either stated or implied in the Press, or a section of it, that the County Council of Limerick were more or less responsible for the tragedy. He

OBSEQUIES OF REV. DENIS TURNER, C.S.S.R.

The obsequies of the late Rev. Denis Turner, C.S.S.R., took place yesterday morning in the Redemptorist Church with Solemn Office and Requiem High Mass, at which the Bishop, Most Rev. Dr. Keane, presided. The remains, enclosed in a heavy oak coffin, rested overnight on a catafalque in the nave of the church opposite the High Altar, which was draped in black. There was a large congregation present, and at the close of the solemn ceremonies the interment took place in the crypt underneath the High Altar.

The celebrant of the Mass was Rev. Fr. Sutton, C.S.S.R.; deacon, Rev. Fr. Feely; Diocesan Inspector; sub-deacon, Rev. Fr. O'Riordan, C.C.; Killimane, and master of ceremonies, Rev. Fr. MacNamara, Athlone, St. John's.

There was a large number of clergy in the choir, and at the close of the solemn service the Bishop pronounced the absolution.

Health Board's Condolence.

At the meeting of the City Board of Health, last night, Alderman O'Flynn alluding to the death of Rev Fr. Turner said he was a great priest and distinguished preacher. In Limerick his death had been learned with sincere regret, particularly by the members of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family of which he was spiritual director for a brief period. He proposed that the Board express its sincere condolence with the relatives, his brothers Most Rev. Dr. Turner, Bishop of Buffalo, Right Rev. Dr. Turner, New York, and the Provincial, Redemptorist Order. The resolution was passed in silence.

The correspondence included a letter from Rev. Mother Bernardine, Limerick, thanking the Committee for their kind resolution of sympathy on the death of Very Rev. On the proposition of Mr. C. D. O'Sullivan a resolution of sympathy was passed to Mr. Willie Cahill, Clouneskehane, on the death of his uncle, Mr. David Cahill. Mr. O'Sullivan spoke of the very great interest the late Mr. Cahill took in the Show Society, and of the practical and kindly assistance he always gave in furthering the good work. He (Mr. Sullivan) was pleased to know that his nephew, Mr. Cahill, was one of the most useful members of the Society and following in the footsteps of his uncle. The Chairman and others joined in the expressions of sympathy, and Mr. Cahill, who was present, returned his sincere thanks to Mr. Sullivan, the Chairman, and the Committee.

It was pointed out that the punctual and active co-operation of the members appointed on the Superintendence Committees was the one great essential for the success of the show, and in view of this all the members of the Superintendence Committees are to be invited to a special meeting to be held on Tuesday evening the 14th September, at 5 p.m. (old time).

PRESIDENT COSGRAVE IN LIMERICK.

President Cosgrave, accompanied by Mr. Finian Lynch, Minister of Fisheries, Professor O'Sullivan, Minister of Education, and Mr. Batt O'Connor, T.D., arrived in Limerick by motor to-day, on his way to Listowel. The President, during his brief sojourn, put up at Cruise's Hotel, where luncheon was served. The party were received by the Mayor (Councillor P. A. O'Brien), Mr. P. McMahon, P.C., members of the City Council of Cumma-in-Gaethéal, and Corporation, while a large contingent motored up from Kerry to escort the President in his journey to Listowel. Before the party left they were photographed outside the hotel, and as the President's car moved cheers were given by the crowd that had congregated in the vicinity.

COUNTY COUNCIL CLERKSHIP.

An examination was held in the County Council Chamber yesterday for the position of assistant in the office of the County Surveyor for the western division of the County, rendered vacant by the death some months ago of Mr. John Portley. There was a large number of candidates, the examination being conducted by an official of the Local Government Department. The examination, it is understood, a qualifying one, and gives the Council the option of voting on the candidates who have secured the requisite number of marks.

Mr. John McCormack observed that it had been either stated or implied in the Press, or a section of it, that the County Council of Limerick were more or less responsible for the tragedy. He wished on behalf of the Council to repudiate these statements and implications. The Council were never up, reached or asked for a licence, and did not give one. That being so the Council protested, and repudiated these insinuations.

Mr. George C. Bennett concurring, said that the County Council were most careful in giving the use of the halls and courthouses they controlled for entertainments. The fact was that there was a resolution on their books not to give the use of their courthouses for any class of entertainment whatever. He proposed the following—"That we call on the authorities to see that cinema houses, not duly licensed, be closed forthwith in this county."

The motion was adopted unanimously.

Sir James Craig, Alberta, Canada, Prime Minister Northern Ireland, sent the following—"President Cosgrave, Dublin—Permit me to express to you my deepest sympathy with the relatives of the victims of the terrible disaster at Drumcollogher.—Jas. Craig."

The President's reply is—"Am deeply grateful for your kind expression of sympathy which I have transmitted to relatives of victims of disaster at Drumcollogher.—Cosgrave."

Message from Earl of Dudley.

The Governor-General has received the following telegram from the Earl of Dudley, who is at Baden-Baden—"Just read of terrible accident. County Limerick. Please accept my deepest sympathy."

His Excellency replied:—"Most grateful for your sympathy for Drumcollogher sufferers."
