### "A WRETCHED CASE."

At the Quarter Sessions on Tuesday his Honor Judge Adams gave a verdict of 7s 6d to James Monin, who sued the Committee of a Quadrille class to recover £5 damages for injury alleged to have been done to his property by the defendants tearing down hangings, etc.

The complaint was that the members of a class were leaving a hall which they had rented from the plaintiff they tore down calico, cretonne, and balsass, covering the walls, to the value of £3.

His Honor—"They broke the lovely windies along with curtains from the ladies' (laughter)."

The defense was that only the materials put up by the defendants or previous members of the dance class were removed and that no glass was broken or any harm done.

The plaintiff gave only two days' notice that he required possession, and when the members came to dance they found the place blockaded, a carpenter's bench in it.

The Treasurer of the Class addressed the ladies present, thanking them for their attendance, and expressing regret that they could not dance that night, as they had expected to have another dance before Lent.

His Honor said it was a wretched case. "The

it Saraband had been danced in the hall," and the members getting short notice of being turned out before the carnival preceding Lent, were innocent, and tore down some things to have a "rise" out of the plaintiff, but did no harm, still

they acted improperly. They were most respectable people. He gave a decree for 7s 6d.
