Mr. J. J. Kelly, Castleconnell, also gave evidence in regard to the cormorant, it was found to live principally on salmon. He would say that it consumed about 1 lb of fish per day, and that each pair of birds would do about £20 worth of damage yearly to the fishery. The damage caused yearly to the fishery by the merganser and cormorant, he estimated at £100,000. He says that the cost of the Shannon, at least, for the cormorants, is £100,000. He says that the birds feed and live on the banks of the river, namely—salmon, trout, and other kinds of fishes can be seen living amongst the weeds; a large quantity of fish resulted from the destruction of the weeds.

—Are these birds practically useless? No. They are no good to anybody. No one has ever seen either a cormorant or a merganser added that he was obliged to go to Holland in order to make a net.
