#### THE CLARE FAMILY.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to give and grant unto the Hon Gerald Normanby Dillon, and his wife, Lady Louisa Isabella Georgina Dillon, of Mountshannon, in the co. Limerick, daughter and co-heiress of Richard Hobart Fitzgibbon, third and last son of Earl of Clare, her Royal Licence and Authority, bearing date at St James's, the 8th day of November, 1878; and they, the said Hon Gerald Normanby Dillon and Lady Louisa Isabella Georgina Dillon, his wife, and their issue, may take and henceforth use the surname of Fitzgibbon only, in lieu of that of Dillon, and bear the arms of Fitzgibbon quarterly with the arms of Dillon, in consideration of the said Lady Louisa Isabella Georgina Dillon having become heiress of John Fitzgibbon, second Earl of Clare, her only brother, Charles Henry Viscount Fitzgibbon, having fallen in action at Balaklava on the 25th day of October, 1854.
