DEATH OF MR FRAWLEY, INSPECTOR OF MARKETS.—We regret to record the very unexpected demise of Mr John Frawley, Inspector of Limerick Markets, which took place at his residence, Mulgrave street, last night, at 11 p.m. Death was due to a shock of apoplexy with which Mr Frawley was seized early on yesterday morning. He was over 30 years in the employment of the Markets Trustees, and some twenty years ago was appointed to the inspectorship in room of Mr Robert Wheeler. Mr Frawley was a painstaking and careful officer, while his courteous and unobtrusive manner won for him the respect of the Trustees and the public to whom he was known so long. He was about seventy years of age, and a widower. Interment will take place to-morrow.
