**METHODIST VOTE OF SYMPATHY.**

At a special meeting of the Quarterly Board of Stewards and Leaders of the Methodist Church (Limerick Circuit) it was proposed by Mr. Christy, senior, seconded by Mr. DeCourcy—"That the members of the Quarterly Board, in special meeting now assembled, pass a vote of condolence and sympathy with the family of the late Very Rev. J. F. The following letter has since been sent:—

"The Methodist Church, Limerick,

"DEAR MISS GREGG,—At a special meeting of the Quarterly Board of Stewards and Leaders of the Methodist Church, Limerick Circuit, held on 2nd inst., under the Presidency of Rev. Alexander Egan, a vote of sympathy and condolence was unanimously passed to the members of the family of the late Very Rev. J. F. Gregg, M.A., Dean of Limerick, and this we now beg to convey.

"We are also instructed to intimate that the Board has always recognised and appreciated the sterling character, powerful and sympathetic influence of good, sincere charity, and nobleness of purpose, which invariably actuated your venerable father in the numerous institutions and efforts for good which he had at heart.
