THE LATE DEAN OF LIMERICK.

Limerick Board of Guardians yesterday unanimously passed a vote of condolence with the family of the late Dean of Limerick. The Union Jack is at half-mast on St. Mary's Cathedral Tower, and the bell is tolled at intervals. Various fixtures have been postponed as a mark of respect to the memory of the Dean.

The funeral will take place from Corbally at 11 o'clock to-morrow for St. Mary's Cathedral.

DEATH OF THE DEAN OF RAPHOE.

It has just been learned in Londonderry that the Very Rev. Joseph Potter, Dean of Raphoe, was found dead in bed, at the Vicarage, Letterkenny. Dean Potter was a prominent clergyman of the Church of Ireland, and but recently preached at the Church Congress at Weymouth; indeed, on Wednesday week he took part in the proceedings of the Diocesan Synod in Londonderry, when he appeared in his usual health. The intelligence of his death has caused quite a shock in Londonderry. For over twenty years he was Incumbent of Christ Church, leaving the city two years ago on his promotion to the Deanery of Raphoe.

THE SWEDISH FLAG HOISTED.

A Reuter's Stockholm telegram says:— Amidst the booming of guns and pealing of bells the pure Swedish flag—that is the flag without the emblem of the Union—was hoisted at the Castle and Riksdag Buildings at nine o'clock yesterday morning. A profusion of bunting quickly sprang up all over the city.
