The High Court has ordered Mr. F. R. Lees, of Chichester, to give further particulars as to a claim of £500 against the Limerick Harbour Commissioners, for alleged damages to the steamer "Progress" while lying in the dock here.

The Technical Committee yesterday afternoon had under consideration the arrangements for receiving the delegates at the Technical Congress to be held next month. It was decided to form a citizens' committee, and to ask the support of the Chamber of Commerce and Corporation.

The "Dublin Gazette" of last night states that his Majesty's letters patent have passed the Great Seal of Ireland appointing the Right Honourable the Earl of Kenmare, C.V.O., to his Majesty's Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum for and of the County Kerry.

The Mayor held a Court to-day to hear claims for admission as Freeman. Mr. Thomas O'Connell, superintendent water department, Mr. James O'Halloran, foreman of the "Chronicle," and Mr Robert Gubbins, carpenter, the three applicants were admitted.

The High Court in the case of Westropp v. the Clare County Council, as to the liability for the repair of a road at Scariff, has given Mr. Westropp the verdict and 1s damages. The Council is to pay all the costs, because in the opinion of the judges, by their neglect of duty they caused the litigation.

Mr. Horan, Inspector of the Star Life Assurance Society at Tipperary, has succeeded in winning first prize, a gold watch, in the competition started by the Irish Management, for the largest business done in February and March by any agent in Ireland. This is not the first time Mr. Horan has headed a list of competitors from all Ireland.

The Corporation had several cases under the Public Health Act at the City Petty Sessions yesterday for the limewashing and other improvement of tenements. Orders were made to have the work done within a specified time, and in some cases, as applied for, an order was granted for the closing of certain premises, as they were unfit for human habitation.

SANITATION IN THE DOCK WARD.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

DEAR SIR,—As one of the members representing the Dock Ward in the Borough Council, I think it my duty to call the attention of the readers of your valuable journal and the public to the sanitary condition of portion of this Ward.

A short time ago I visited the houses in Vize's Fields to see how they stood as regards w.c.'s and sewerage, and to my surprise I found that there were eighty inhabited houses, all within a radius of about three hundred yards (50 in Vize's Fields, and 30 in School House Lane and Little Barrington Street, immediately behind St. Joseph's New Church), completely devoid of sanitary accommodation or sewerage, notwithstanding that one of the best main sewers in the city passes through the locality. Seven new cottages have been recently built in this area, and are provided with all the necessary sanitary arrangements, and connected with the main sewer.

I then took in the Windmill district, and found there only one w.c. connected with the main sewer, out of about fifty houses, seven being without yards. There is a very fine main sewer running through the Dock road at one end, and Henry-street at the other end of this area.

I would like to know very much where the sanitary officer comes in as regards his inspection of these two areas, or have they been ever reported to the sanitary authorities?—although they evidently do their duty well in other wards, going even to the extent of examining the roofs, and if they find any slates off, serve a summons on the owner.

FOUND DROWNED.

Yesterday about midday two fishermen named Costello and McInerney found the body of a man in Ballinacurra Creek. The Thomondgate police were communicated with, and Sergeant Keating had the remains conveyed to the morgue, pending an inquest. The body which was that of a man of about 40 years of age was found fully dressed. He wore a pair of old brown boots but no stockings. On the shirt were the figures 7096, the inscription being that the deceased was a soldier. It is thought that the case may have some connection with the finding of a pair of boots and stockings near Corbally mill stream eight days ago, and also a piece of paper bearing words to the effect that the writer was tired of soldiering, and that his body would be found near by. The fact, however, of boots having been found on the body discovered yesterday does not quite coincide with the theory, and in addition, no soldier has been reported missing from this district.

REMAINS IDENTIFIED.

Mr. Coroner Clery, Hospital, held an inquest at the County Courthouse this evening on the remains, which have been identified as those of Thady Guiney, of Glogog, Toumfulla, who had been discharged from the Royal Munster Fusiliers Depot, Tralee, on the 28th and was seen in the city on Saturday. A verdict of death from drowning was returned.
