County graveyards project uncovering buried history

A HISTORIC graveyards survey is underway in West Limerick with work already completed by trained volunteers in Abbeyfeale, Adare, Ardagh, Askeaton, Broadford, Castlemahon, Feenagh, Knockaderry, Rathkeale and Shanagolden.

According to West Limerick Resources (WLR) project officer Suzanne Rowley, the work completed to date is only "the tip of the iceberg".

"This is slow, detailed work and we have completed 12 graveyards with the details fully uploaded on the historicgraves.com website. Work continues at a further 12 graveyards and we hope that these results will be fully uploaded by early Spring. From there, we plan to work with local volunteers to carry out surveys at other local graveyards.

"It took a lot of time to ensure the surveys are complete and accurate. It is essential work as important genealogical and local history information is gradually being lost as gravestone inscriptions fade over time.

network that can help drive activities forward", Ms Rowley explained.

Eachtra Archaeological Projects are also involved in the project and progress was outlined at a seminar "Over the past two years, WLR in Newcastle West which highlighted some of the more interesting headstones, iconography and stories which had been identified to date.

hopes that the surveys will not only record inscriptions on headstones, but also the stories behind the craftspeople who created the headstones and the life stories of those buried there.
