THE SHANNON BOATING DISASTER.
ANOTHER BODY FOUND.
(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)
Tarbert, Saturday.

On yesterday the body of Thomas Glazer was washed ashore at Rallagrans, two miles west of Tarbert lighthouse and quite close to the place where the ill-fated boat was last seen. The body was very much disfigured, and was only recognised by the clothes. There are still seven bodies missing, of which the following is a list:—Mary Scanlan, Bridget Scanlan, Hannah Sullivan, Johanna McGrath, Mary Lyndon, Patrick Murphy, Michael Scanlan. Only two of the seven women were found.

GLIN SCHOOL BOARD.
A meeting of the Glin School Board was held to-day in the City Dispensary, Mr J O'Shaughnessy, J.P., Kilmallock, presided. There were also present—Messrs Wm O'Brien, D.L., Rathkeale Union, Edmund Duodon, do.; William Connolly, Kilmallock Union; Wm Fitzmaurice, Tarbert Union; Francis Fitzgerald, Rathkeale Union, and D F McNamara, Limerick Union. Mr H J Guinane, secretary, was also present. The minutes of the previous meeting having been confirmed, the secretary read the correspondence, which included letters from Messrs F A O'Keefe, and M Austin, M.P.s, with reference to the obtaining of a loan from the Treasury for carrying out the alteration at Glin School. Both gentlemen expressed their opinion that from the replies received from the Secretary to the Treasury there would be no difficulty in getting the loan. A letter was received from the Local Government Board sanctioning the plans and specifications for the alterations in the school, and a further communication was received from the same source asking for a detailed statement as to how the £3,000 proposed to be borrowed was to be expended. The secretary was requested to furnish the necessary information. It was decided to advertise for tenders for the erection of a dormitory, and the supplying and erection of a cooking apparatus. After some routine business had been disposed of, the meeting adjourned.

THE BAKERS' STRIKE.
CHARGE OF ASSAULT AGAINST A BAKER.
At the Police Court this morning, before Dr O'Shaughnessy, a baker named John Neiland, was charged in custody by Acting-Sergeant Rose, with having assaulted Mrs Smith, a shopkeeper in Bridge-street, on last evening. From the information on which the accused was arrested, it appears that while the woman was sitting at her door yesterday, Neiland, who was in company with four other bakers on strike, came up to her saying words to the effect that he would put her from selling that bread. She told him to go about his business; thereupon he hit her with his hand into the face; she believed it was because she was dealing with the Croom Mills Bakery that this act of violence was committed on her. Dr O'Shaughnessy—I thought this strike was settled.

THE LATE MR JAMES HARAN, J.P.
TESTIMONIAL FORMED.
In pursuance of a circular signed by the Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer, the Mayor, Mr David Timmins, Hon. Secretary, *pro tem*, and Mr James Quin, J.P., Hon. Treasurer, *pro tem*, a meeting of the citizens was held to-day at the Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of recognising in a suitable manner the late Mr James Haran's able and sympathetic management of the National Bank here for many years past. Although convened at very short notice, and on a day by no means convenient to business men, the attendance was very large, and representative of all classes and creeds. This in itself testified to the great popularity that Mr Haran enjoyed in commercial circles in the city, while it was also an eloquent expression of deep sympathy with his family in their irreparable loss. The meeting was of a semi-private character. The Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer occupied the chair, and there were also present—The Mayor, Hon. The Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer very feelingly alluded to the demise of Mr Haran, and thanked the gentlemen present for their spontaneous attendance. Mr Quin and Father Murphy were appointed Secretaries, and Mr Quin read a number of letters, enclosing subscriptions. Father Fitzgerald read a telegram from Mr T E O'Brien, D.L., authorising his name to be put down for £100. The Mayor proposed, and Mr Alfred Allen seconded the following resolution, which was passed unanimously:—"That this meeting desires to put on record its sense of the great loss which this city has sustained in the death of the late manager of the National Bank here, James Haran, Esq., and its admiration of the manner in which for twelve years he discharged the duties of his responsible office, combining, as he did, the strictest fidelity to his superiors and the institution over which he was placed, with a broad and liberal administration, by which, in times of difficulty, he maintained the credit of many traders, and contributed to the commercial prosperity of the city." The Hon. Gaston Mounsell, who apologised for the absence of Lord Ebury, proposed the following resolution, which was seconded by Mr Arthur White, and passed unanimously—"That services such as those which Mr Haran rendered to the city deserve at our hands a formal and public recognition, and that accordingly we should ask his widow and children to accept from us a testimonial as a slight expression of the regret and esteem in which we hold his memory, and of our sympathy with them in their great bereavement." Mr Welpley proposed, and Mr W Spillane seconded, the following resolution, which was adopted—"That a subscription list be now opened, and that his Lordship, Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer, the Mayor (Mr B O'Donnell), and Mr James Quin, be requested to act as Trustees."

The Rev Father Fitzgerald, P.P., proposed, and Mr James Quin, J.P., seconded, the following resolution, which was passed *nem. con.*:—"That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the directors of the National Bank, with a request that they should give to Mrs Haran and her children the Government Board for Ireland to state usual scale of payment is £ for each inspected, and reported on by the medical and 2 guineas per day for attendance on local inquiry, and the Board Bank guardians would do well to adopt this course." "Sir—The Local Government Board have had before them the resolution by the Board of Guardians of Newcastle on the 24th ult, relative to the rates required for the expenditure of the Union year ending 29th Sept, 1894, from which appears that the Clerk's estimate, which was correctly prepared, has been reduced to an aggregate amount of about £318, the portion of Caher and Port electoral divisions being reduced by 2s and 8d respectively. The Board request that they may be informed of the reasons for making the reduction of the estimates, especially in the case of the electoral divisions named.—Yours, &c."

THE RATES.
The Clerk asked the guardians to order the rate-collectors arrear sheets with the closing the collections and taking up the work before those for the new rate would be issued.
Chairman—Have any lodgments been since our last inspection of the arrear sheets? Clerk—No.
Chairman—What then is the need of overhauling the arrear sheets now, when we know they stand?
Mr Minogue—About a month ago we had the sheets were in a position to be closed.
Chairman—On the Thursday subsequent matter was gone into and after a great deal of deliberation the Guardians of whom there was a large number in attendance came to the conclusion that there were many collectable items in the arrear sheets of all the collectors, and although they were until to-day to close their warrants, not a penny has been lodged in the meantime.
