## CAPPAMORE STUDENTS SUCCESSFUL

## CHEAP FUEL SCHEME

This year's Cheap Fuel Scheme has just been put into operation by the Corporation, and will be formally approved tonight by the City Council. The grant allocated is £8,400, which is an increase of £1,200 on last year's allocation. With this enlarged grant, it will be possible to supply 37,200 hundredweights of turf, and the Limerick Health Authority will finance the provision of 35,000 hundredweights. This makes the total for distribution 40,700 hundredweights.

### CATEGORIES

The scheme provides for the supply of one hundredweight of turf a week to the following categories, at a charge of 3/- a hundredweight:

- People getting Unemployment Assistance who have one or more dependents.
- Those receiving the Non-contributory Old Age Pension, or the Blind Pension, or the Widows' and Orphans' Pension.
- Persons with a low weekly income who satisfy the City Manager that they are in need of assistance to procure sufficient fuel.

### TURF

In addition, people receiving Home Assistance will be supplied with one hundredweight of turf each week, free of charge. Vouchers for the scheme will be issued by Post Offices, Employment Exchange and Home Assistance Officers, they may be exchanged for fuel at the Merchant's Yard.
