Richard Harris as "Cromwell" At The Savoy

SAVOY

LIMERICK - BORN actor, Richard Harris, gives what has been hailed as "his greatest screen performance" in "Cromwell" — a film in which he shares top billing with Alec Guinness.

The film is the next attraction at the Savoy Cinema, Limerick.

Mr. Harris gives a powerful performance in the title role and Alec Guinness is an excellent foil as King Charles I in this interesting historical production.

The King wants money to fight his overseas wars, and Parliament refuses him. Cromwell, a Puritan, landowner, Member of Parliament and idealist, is goaded into battle against Charles, as much through force of circumstances as anything else.

Neither man could foresee the way events were to lead. The pomp, pageantry and background of the age is cleverly reproduced, especially in the battle scenes.

The film was directed by Ken Hughes, and local interest will be very strong in view of the presence of Mr. Harris in the film.

● The current double-feature programme here is "Lovers and Other Strangers" and "Say Hello to Yesterday" — an "over 18's show," which is playing to big houses.

CARLTON

ROYAL

THERE are a number of big revivals paired for this house for the coming week. "Carry On... Up the Khyber," has the "Carry On" gang

Co-feature: "Shanandoah," has James Stewart and Doug McClure in a Western which ranks as one of the most entertaining for many years.

Thursday's "No Time for Tears" has Anna Neagle, George Baker and Sylvia Syms, while the support, "Laughter in Paradise" with Alastair Sim and Hay Compton, completes a splendid double.

LYRIC

"LOVING" co-stars George Segal and Eva Marie Saint in the story of a commercial artist desperately juggling a shaky marriage and a collapsing career.

With excellent performances from the two stars, the

film has been hailed as "a real success" in Dublin and elsewhere.

He is Professor Alex Bolt — the inventor of a new global language.
