Richard Harris tutors college students

LIMERICK ACTOR Richard Harris moved from the stage to the classroom last weekend when he began a month-long assignment as a visiting professor at the University of Scranton.

Harris is teaching a drama class during the University's intersession period, during which he is preparing his students for a production of "Julius Caesar, A Work in Progress".

The play, a new version of the Shakespeare classic written by Harris, will be performed February 4-6 at the Masonic Temple in Scranton.

Foundation

Proceeds from the play will benefit the Dermot Harris Foundation, a scholarship program that Richard Harris established at the U. of S. in memory of his late brother. The scholarships enable students from the Harris brothers' native Ireland to attend the University.

Harris had agreed to teach at the University when he visited the school in October of 1986 while the touring production of "Camelot" was playing in Scranton.

Harris said he views the production of the play as a laboratory that will test new theatrical concepts and approaches.

A month later, his brother, Dermot, died during "Camelot's" run in Chicago. Soon after Richard Harris initiated the scholarship program as a memorial to Dermot.

The actor said he chose the University of Scranton because it is a Jesuit school and both he and Dermot were educated by the Jesuits in Ireland. In addition, the Harris brothers had forged close friendships with several Scranton area residents, including University President Rev. J. A. Panuska, S.J.

Audition

The first scholarship recipient, Peter Power, from Carrick-on-Suir, entered the University in September.

Harris returned to Scranton in November to audition the students who would take his class and make up the cast for "Julius Caesar, A Work in Progress".

Fifty students are enrolled in the three-credit course titled English 98, "The Harris Seminar". According to Harris, the course will combine lectures, lessons, dramatic presentations and rehearsals for the play.
