"I had a very good childhood, I had a good family. I think in a strange way my family background had an awful lot to do with my career," he said in an interview.
"We came from a very well-off family. I remember in my hume we had gardeners, chauffeurs, we had private tutors. I was very small. I then remember my mother on her knees scrubbing floors, turning white overnight, hating Mondays because she had to wash clothes for eight children, do sheets because the money was some.

"The business just collapsed year after year, bits of it got closed down and things were bad. So somewhere in my mind, in

my psyche, I believed I had it easy and then it was very bad. And somehow or other I said that my children would never be like this, and I would never be like this again.
"I couldn't handle that kind of change so I remember when I was about 40 I said "You know, this is not going to go on forever Richard, or Dickie, the phone isn't going to keep ringing. Times are going to change, a new era is going to come in, you won't be in demand anymore. So I decided then I was going to make a lot of money."

Which he did, most notably by acquiring the rights to the highly successful Camelot, in which he has played the leading role all over the world.

He hasn't been reckless with his money and it seems highly unlikely that Richard Harris will feel hard times again.
